COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What is Going On in the Business World—The Market News.

Two coal mines are now in successful operation in Alaska. They produce good steam coal.

Kingston Soldiers Well. A letter was received in the city this morning from William Bowman, 401 King street, now in South Africa with the mounted rifles.

Is More Trouble Coming? Rumors were prevalent on the streets to-day that there would be further serious trouble at the locomotive works.

Thrown Out Of The Rig. Thomas Dine, while driving between the city and Kingston Mills this morning, overtook a lady on the road, to whom he gave a "lift" on her journey.

A Buffalo Rumor. A Buffalo paper publishes a rumor that a large number of Roumanian Jews were smuggled over the United States border near Kingston, on Sunday night.

Body Of Beaman Is Found. The body of Charles Beaman, Round Island, drowned July 12th, came up last evening fifty feet from where it sank. The body was taken to Clayton to await a coroner.

British Reserve In South Africa. London, July 21.—A despatch from Pretoria says the area of country between the Sabi and Crocodile rivers in the eastern Transvaal has been proclaimed as a government reserve.

SHOWING A GOOD FEELING.

SETTLING FASTER THAN WAS EXPECTED.

A TORONTO MYSTERY.

Employee of Drug House Found Dead on Premises.

Toronto, July 21.—Another extraordinary fatality was discovered to-day in the wholesale drug warehouse of Evans & Son, Front street. Geo. Whalley, aged thirty-five, a shipper, was found lying dead in the basement with blood upon his face, apparently from his nose.

THE STRIKE AT WINNIPEG.

THE RAILROAD COMPANY IS LIKELY TO WIN.

The Prospects for the Crops in the Northwest—The Industrial Exhibition at Winnipeg Has Been Opened.

Winnipeg, July 21.—The Canadian Northern strike still drags along, although it seems a foregone conclusion now that the company will be able to wear the men out at the waiting game.

The industrial exhibition was opened at ten o'clock this morning when the directors' lunch took place.

The All-India steamer Austrian, from Glasgow, for Boston, passed Cape Race at 4.30 a.m. on Monday.

The All-India steamer Norwegian, from Montreal, for Glasgow, arrived on Sunday, and landed all her live stock without loss.

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The whalerback steamer A. D. Thompson and consort Whitworth stranded in the fog off Point Aux Basques, three miles south of Detroit, on Sunday. The Thompson is leaking.

New York capitalists will open a steel plant, a glass factory and a locomotive works at Parkersburg, W. Va. The latter will turn out 180 locomotives a year, and will cost \$1,000,000.

Patrick J. Enright, Syracuse, N.Y., who jumped from a second story window on Sunday, N.Y., hotel, died on Sunday. Deceased was thirty-six years of age, and formerly a government official. He imagined some one wanted to kill him, and steal his wife and child.

The Coney Island police are hard at work investigating the death of Dr. Edward L. Parker, of Geneva, N.Y., whose body was found in the surf last Wednesday. The police declare that suicide and accident theories are not to be considered, but that the young doctor was murdered for his money by thugs.

Addie Murphy, daughter of bank president and millionaire S. G. Murphy, San Francisco, Cal., eloped with and married John C. Breckinridge, a grandson of the late Lloyd Tevis and of John Cahill Breckinridge, of Kentucky, who ran against Lincoln for the presidency.

The celebrated Bennett-Bigger will case has been settled. Heirs of the late Henry M. Bennett, of Pittsburgh, Pa., decided to compromise and allow the will to be probated. The will of Henry Bennett was made on September 27th, 1901. His housekeeper, Miss Laura Bigger, an actress of New York, was bequeathed the greater portion of his estate.

Millane's Story At Syracuse. When returned to Syracuse, N.Y., John Millane, arrested here for complicity in the theft of \$303 from Mrs. O'Leary, had \$223.69 on his person. He will be held as an accomplice.

Police constable Aiken to-day received a letter from his son, trooper Edwin Aiken, C.M.R. It was dated at Newcastle, South Africa, June 21st. No mention is made of the intended return of the young man, who says that all along the route he had so far traversed were to be seen graves of British soldiers.

Police constables Hegarty and Craig drove out to Collins Bay yesterday in search of a young man against whom information has been laid, but they were unsuccessful in their mission.
