## Even These Cultivated.

The great sugar-beet industry of th world owes its very existence to discovery of Vilmorin. The original sugar beet grown in France did not contain enough sugar for commerce The amount of sugar could be easily determined in the beet, but in making the test the reproductive qualities of the plant were always destroyed. Vilmorin learned how to extract the pulp without destroying the plant and by selection and cross-breeding he grew a plant upon which the great industry is now founded. We owe also to Vilmorin the present carrot, a vegetable which was nothing more than a thin, dry, hard, woody root unfit for the stomach of a sheep or cow. Year after year, he sowed in bed and carefully examined root. By selecting seed from only the best plants for the new sowing. produced a carrot with more flesh and less wood. The horse-radish, the turnip, and, indeed, the potato vine, were once plants with thin, woody roots, without the least gestion that they would ever develop into food for man or beast.

Indianapolis, July 24.—"Billy" Sunday, known in baseball circles years ago as the renowned infielder of the Chicago club, is doing missionary work in the Indiana gas belt towns and is talking to crowds of laboring people every night. He has become as widely known as an evangelist as he once was as a baseball player, and though it is many years since he was associated with Anson, Pfeffer, Kelly Burns and others who made up the Chicago aggregation, he often refers to his old chums and the kind words they gave him when he determined to

reform. He is telling the story of his con version and the happiness the new life has brought him to Indiana audiences every night, and, incidentally, he has woven into his addresses the story of how prayer, as he verily believes, say. ed a game of baseball.
