Burned With Wreck-Struck a Loaded Car at High Speed. Xenia, Ohio, July 25.-Seven persons were killed and seventeen injured and four others missing as a result of

last night's wreck on the Pennsylvania railway at Trebin, three miles from here. The dead are : William Dwyer, Columbus, Ohio; M. M. Peters, postal clerk, Columbus, Ohio; Chas, M. Gogan, postal clerk, Greenfield Ind.; two unknown women and one unknown man.

The unknown killed were burned the Pullman cars. The four persons missing were probably also burned in the wreck.

The wrecked train was flying eastward at highest speed when the gine struck a loaded car, which, the darkness, had escaped from siding in Xenia, and had run down a grade to the danger point. SNAILS RAISED FOR FOOD France is Chief Market for Gastropods in World.

New York Tribune. The popularity of the snail as article of food is not confined Paris, but extends throughout south ern Europe and some parts of Africa. Dr. Edrard, a French writer, in pamphlet says that 90,000 pounds snails are sent daily to Paris from the gardens at Poitou, Burgundy, Champange and Provence. Those reared in gardens are fed on aromatic herbs to improve their flavor. Their market price is from two francs fifty centimes to three francs fifty centimes a hundred, while those from the hedges, woods and forests bring only two francs to two francs fifty centimes.
