Until last August the main cave had only been penetrated to a depth of 200 feet, and even that distance could only be reached by the posses sors of small hodies. At that time I t. Dulton, a young man from New York, succeeded in creeping and crawl ing through the narrow crevice at the 200-foot point and over 100 feet further he found the cavity gradually widening until it grew into a cavern much larger than that near the sur ace. He found several smaller caves eading out of the large one, all almost solid ice, and he believes that they lend far into the earth.
