They Were All Poor Fellows From the Philippines - What the Country Owes to Those Who Follow the Flag.

Chicago, Ill., July 26.-Twenty in sane men, manacled and wild-eyed were the breakfast guests of alderman Henry L. Fick, of the Ninth ward, vesterday. The men filed into the al dermen's restaurant, fell into line at he command "attention," sat down y command and ate in the habitual to military men.

The men are soldiers from th Philippines, tall, stalwart and litheimised, but everyone is as mad as March hare, Under command of general officer, they are on the way to Washington, where they are to be cared for and, if possible, restored to

The chains that were clasped about the soldiers' wrists allowed the men sufficient play to permit of handling

After the men had finished they waited quietly until the order came to march back to the car. Not one created any disturbance.

"I never saw a sadder sight," said Ald. Fick. "The soldiers were splendid looking men, but all crazy. It was pathetic. At first I could scarcely realize that the men were insane. but I edged too close to one soldier a giant of a man. He turned upon me and snarled like an animal, 'Get out of here!' I never before realized what a debt this country owes to the men who follow the flag."
