## THE DEAR BLUSHING

BLUSHING A DISEASE OF THE NERVES.

European Women Much Afflicted by it-In Men it Often notes Sufferers From Heart Dinease.

Vienna, July 28.-Dr. Eulenburg, the noted Vienna scientist, who has made an especial study of blushing, declares that it is a disease of the nerves, and that the women of America suffer far less from the affliction than those of Europe. Dr. Eulenburg recently returned from a visit to America and hence speaks with some degree of authority Some very interesting cases of blush ing among American society girls came under his observation. Europeans, he says, are wont to call the American wirl unduly advanced and calculating, but y observation shows that she has a great deal of sensitive ness stored, for if she had not, the blood would not rise so often to her heeks on small provocation, or for

no provocation at all. He tells of a certain Newport heir ess, extremely pretty, who was driven to forswear society because the unfortunate affliction of blushing extended to her beautiful neck and arms, and thus prevented her from appearing in full dress. She suffered not only outwaruly, but lost all self-control when blushing. Her thoughts became "all mixed up," and she could not speak connectedly. She underwent treatould not help her.

Another singular case was that of ending actress, who consulted doctor during his trip to the United States. She had ruined her comptexion, says he, by excessive use of white grease paint applied to coverher blushes, which marred her per ormance. She blushed whenever any thing went wrong behind the scenes or on the stage, and had no control of her emotions.

Dr. Eulenburg has discovered that those addicted to blushing suffer less in summer than in the cold months, and that summer is the best time in which to be treated for the annoying disease. There are critical times, even the warm months, for the blusher When a thunderstorm is in the air and in the damp of the early morning and late at night, persons addicted to the habit blush most often and most violently, says the professor. Strong men do not blush except under extraordinary circumstances. Blushing men are seldom cured, for they are often sufferers from heart disease.

The gall-producer is the tiny insect which is responsible for the black knobs and protuberances on plum, cherry and other trees, and on other shrubs. Entomological Society of Washington has been so eager to acquire, to Toronto University or to the Provincial Government if either institution would provide suitable cases for the insects. Neither the University nor the Government was generous enough to go to such a slight expense, and as a consequence Canada loses one of the most valuable collections of insects ever made in this

Faith in the Colonies.

A suggestive fact disclosed by the literature of the day is the of English writers in the future of Canada and Australia. This is strongly brought out in an important book by Benjamin Kidd on "The Principles of Western Civilization." It lays stress upon the paramount importance of the western commonwealths in determining the trend of future progress.

Another Englishman, who is equally impressed with the energy of the English-speaking race outside England, is Archibald R. Colquhoun, whose "Mastery of the Pacific" will be published by Heinemann in London soon. The proof sheets reveal a deliberate attempt to prove that the Pacific has become as important as the Mediterranean was in ancient times, or as the Atlantic became after the voyages of Columbus and the wars between England and France for the control of the New World. The book has chapters on the marvellous possibilities of Canada, Japanese progress, the Dutch empire in the Far East, and the development of German enterprise in China and the South Seas.
