Sketches of the Honored. Sir William Mulock, M.P., K.C.M.G., Postmaster-General, was born at Bond Head, York County, Jan. 19, 1843, and was educated at the Newmarket Grammar school and at Toronto University, where he took the degree of B.A. He was called to the bar in 1868, and practised in Toronto.

In 1890 he was created a Q.C. by the Ontario Government. For four years he was one of the examiners in and lecturer on Equity and the Law Society of Upper Canada, and was first elected a Senator of Toronto University in 1873, and became vice-chancellor in 1881.

He was elected to the House of Commons for North York in 1882, and has continued to represent that constituency. He was appointed Postmaster-General on the formation of the Laurier Government. In January, 1898, he established a new 2-cent Canadian postage rate to all parts of the empire.

Sir F. W. Borden, M.P., K.C.M.G., Minister of Militia, was born at Cornwallis, N.S., May 14, 1847, educated at King's College, Windsor, and took his degree of M.B. at Harvard in 1868. He sat in the House of Commons in the Liberal interest from 1874 to 1882, was defeated at the general election in the latter year, and again returned in 1887, and 1891, and 1896. On the formation of the Laurier Government in 1896 he was appointed Minister of Militia.

He presided over the organization and equipment of Canadians for service in South Africa, and was appointed Provincial Treasurer in 1899. He is a son of the late James McMillan, and was born at Wally in 1846. He was educated there and at Colingwood, and served with the volunteers on the Niagara frontier in 1864 and '65, and in the Red River rebellion, under Sir Garnet Wolseley, in 1870. He was elected to the Manitoba Legislature in 1879 and 1880, and entered the Greyhound Government as Provincial Treasurer in 1889. He served as major in the 90th Battalion, Manitoba Grenadiers during the Northwest rebellion of 1885, and succeeded to the command of the battalion in 1887. He was appointed Lieutenant-Governor of Manitoba by the Laurier administration.

Hon. Henri Eliezer Taschereau, K. B., was born at Ste. Marie de Beauce, Que., Oct. 7, 1836, educated at the Quebec Seminary, and called to the bar in 1857. He was raised to the bench as Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of Canada, Oct. 7, 1878. He sat for Beauce in the Canadian Assembly in the Conservative interest, 1861-'67, and supported Sir John Macdonald and Sir G. E. Cartier in carrying the resolutions in favor of Confederation. He received the degree of LL.D. from Laval in 1899.

Hon. Robert Cook, K.B., was born in Leith, Scotland, Sept. 19, 1822, and came to Halifax in 1831. He became a member of the Legislative Council of Nova Scotia in 1872, and President of that body in 1879. He was treasurer of Nova Scotia in 1877-'78.

Lieut.-Col. Arthur Percy Sherwood, C.M.G., was born in Ottawa, March 12, 1854; was appointed deputy sheriff of Carleton County in June 1877, and Chief of Police of Ottawa in April, 1879. In October, 1882, he was appointed Superintendent of Dominion Police, and in November, 1893, became Commissioner of Dominion Police. He is a son of the late Robert Harris, C.M.G., was born in the Vale of Conway, North Wales, and came with his parents to Prince Edward Island in 1856. He was appointed a member of the Royal Canadian Academy of Arts in 1880, being nominated by the founder, the Marquis de Lorne, and was elected President of that body in 1890, but declined to serve.

SELLS HIS INSECTS.

Dr. Brodie Gets \$1,000 for His Collection of 18,747 Ontario Gall-Producing Insects.

Dr. William Brodie, of Toronto, a gentleman now well advanced in years, is one of the most learned biologists and entomologists in Canada.

For forty years he has been the authority to whom all younger naturalists send their puzzling bug and beetle for identification. During many decades Dr. Brodie has been the patient collector of birds and insects. In consequence he has gained an international reputation among scholars.

This enviable reputation for scholarship is now enhanced by the fact that he has just been offered \$1,000 for his collection of gall-producing insects. This collection is made up entirely of insects found in Ontario, and contains 18,747 specimens.

The collection has been purchased by the Entomological Society of Washington, and is probably the most complete ever gathered by a patient and enthusiastic scholar. The gall-producing insect has been Dr. Brodie's specialty. He has hunted it for many years, and is now the recognized authority on its habitat and habits. The gall-producer is the tiny insect which is responsible for the black knobs and protuberances on pines, cherries and other trees, and on other shrubs.

Some years ago Dr. Brodie offered to give the collection which the Entomological Society of Washington has been so eager to acquire, to Toronto University or to the Provincial Government if either institution would provide suitable cases for the insects. Neither the University nor the Government was generous enough to go to such a slight expense, and as a consequence Canada has been one of the most valuable collections of insects ever made in this country.

Faith in the Colonies. A suggestive fact disclosed by the literature of the day is the faith of English writers in the future of Canada and Australia. This is strongly brought out in an important book by Benjamin Kidd on "The Principles of Western Civilization."

It lays stress upon the paramount importance of the western commonwealths in determining the trend of future progress.

Another Englishman, who is equally impressed with the energy of the English-speaking race outside England, writes in the "Future of the World" that the Pacific will be published by Heinemann in London soon. The proof sheets reveal a deliberate attempt to prove that the Pacific has become as important as the Mediterranean was in ancient times, or as the Atlantic became after the voyages of Columbus and France for the control of the New World. The book has chapters on the marvelous possibilities of Canada, Japanese progress, the Dutch empire in the Far East, and the development of German enterprise in China and the South Seas.

University Ideals. In his lecture at Toronto University a recent Saturday afternoon, Prof. Halford Douglas, of Knox College, speaking on "University Ideals," dealt with the three aspects of a university, first as the field of mental training, second the atmosphere and fellowship in which the student rounded down his character, and third, its national significance. Graphic pictures were given of the Scottish University life as well as of English universities, and the university life of the thirteenth and fourteenth centuries. Professor Douglas argued that what Canada needs is a combination of the inspiration of Scottish universities, with the thoroughness and residential features of the English institutions, as well as a liberal supply of money. The university, he thought, should provide brilliant men with the means and leisure to work out their theories.
