HE WAS BADLY STABBED IN

THE HEAD. No Clew So Far To the Criminals -The Movements Of Steamers -Montreal Shippers Are Up in

Montreal, July 28.-Joseph Gagnier, twenty-eight years of age, re siding at 546 Centre street, Point St. Charles, lies in the hospital with five bad stabs from some sharp instrument in his head. Gagnier had been making some purchases in the city and was returning home just before midnight. Saturday, when near Wellington bridge he was attacked by a gang of thugs. Everything he had was stolen. Passers-by found him unconscious on the roadside, and assisted him to his home from whence he was conveyed to the hospital. It is not thought his injuries are dangerous.
