WHAT IS TRANSPERING AT MANY POINTS.

Yacht Race Results—Sensational Bicycle Racing—Arrival of the Winnipeg Oarsmen at Brockville.

At Perth, the home team defeated Brockville at lacrosse by four goals to two.

The Invader of Toronto again defeated the Genesee of Rochester at the L.Y.R.A. races, held at Cobourg on Saturday.

At Atlantic City, N.Y., Thompson and Boake, two Canadian cyclists, won the two-mile professional tandem race in 3:08.

The Toronto News thinks Bruce, the clever little Indian member of the Toronto Eastern League baseball team, will move in faster society next season.

The Winnipeg rowing club has entered all events in connection with the C.A.A.O. regatta August 2nd-10th, excepting two. The western oarsmen are en route east.

St. Lawrence River League baseball scores Monday: At Canton, 4; Pontiac, 2. At Antwerp, 9; Geneva, 9; Geneva called in on ninth innings on account of darkness.

Chicago the Owensville cup and gold medal were won by Walter E. Egan distanced his field, getting a score of 161 for the United States round, 79 in the morning and 82 in the afternoon. A score of 169 was secured by Chisholm Beach, of Cleveland.

Probably the most sensational bicycle racing ever seen in the United States was witnessed at Newark, N. J. World's records were set by the board in both the amateur and professional races. The most remarkable race came in the ten-mile professional. Of the forty men who started twenty-five were left in at eight miles. A half a mile won by a length and a half in the fastest time ever made, 21:53.1.

Both M. L. Hurley, the national amateur champion, and Walter Smith broke amateur records. Hurley won the quarter-mile race in 28:25 seconds, the best previous time was 29 seconds, made by M. Coffey. Walter Smith then started in to knock out some more records before motor pace. Smith made one mile in 1:26:25, and a little later started again and broke all amateur records from one to five miles, making the five miles in 7:18:55, former record, 7:40.

AGED NAPANEAN DEAD

MISS BRIGGS FATALLY INJURED BY A FALL.

Had Reached the Age of Eighty-five Years.—A Game of Cricket Between Napanea and Deseronto—Personal Notes.

Napanea, July 25.—Miss Briggs, South Napanea, who fell down stairs a week ago, fracturing her leg, died on Saturday from the effects of the fall. She was in her eighty-fifth year and a much respected resident.

As quiet and blameless a life as cloistered virtue could wish, Sam Weller's anecdote of the prisoner who was so terrified by the turkey's threat to lock him out if he didn't get back from the "pob" earlier when he had been led to the right prison have been founded on fact. There are timid or lazy souls that have no fondness for the scramble outside the walls.

The prison fare is good enough for them; the prison discipline not too hard. The old or oldest prisoner has his privileges and honors. He should be a happy man if his conscience is tolerably easy and his digestion fair.

A jail is by no means a place of pain for all. Some folks like freedom and some like gentle constraint and never wish to cut their leading strings. So runs or walks the world away. To lead armies or to peel potatoes, it amounts to much the same thing, and "there is one end of one and all."

Honor King Humbert's Memory.

Rome, July 25.—The second anniversary of the tragic death of King Humbert, who was assassinated at Monza, July 29th, 1900, by Gaetano Besci, an anarchist, was observed today by commemorative services throughout the kingdom. Rome was the centre of the observances, there being hundreds of visitors here on a pilgrimage to the tomb of the dead monarch in the Pantheon. There were music and religious services and delegations filed past the vault containing the remains of King Humbert and there deposited magnificent wreaths in the name of the various provinces of Italy and of civil, military and labor organizations.

Rural Mails Hurt Trade.

Washington, D.C., July 25.—The rural mail delivery was hailed with delight when it was first placed into operation, but there promises to develop a lively opposition to its further extension. The country storekeeper declares that it is ruining his business and he is calling upon his congressmen for redress. Under the old postal regulations the farmer went to the village for his mail, and just so sure as he went he left some money with the storekeeper. Now he remains at home, never going to the village except in cases of necessity, and the services of the mail carrier to do some little chores which he desires.

BRITISH MAIL NOTES.

Items of Interest from the Three Kingdoms

The coronation infant has appeared. A little girl has been named "Corona Alexandra."

Andrew Carnegie has offered Leicester £12,000 for a public library.

Swallow, Wren, Robin and Sparrow are the names of four porters employed at a Yorkshire railway station.

While playing cricket at Dover College a lad named Gardner, was struck by a cricket ball and killed.

At York, Thomas Hudson and Ronald Dean, tobaccoists, were fined £100 and £20 respectively for using their shops for betting purposes.

The seven new coronation peers bring the total of the Lords up to 325. Twelve of these are under age, and therefore, cannot take their seats in parliament.

Pierce rioting took place in Newry, on the Orange celebration on the 12th, in which about twenty policemen, a Presbyterian clergyman and a number of rioters were injured.

Glasgow wishes to have the wording of its civic motto restored from its present reading of "Let Glasgow flourish" to its old form of "Let Glasgow flourish through the preaching of the Word."

At Glasgow the coronation dinner to the poor, the only event not cancelled, was given to 15,000 ticket holders for the treat. Each got some steak, pie, puddings or tart, cake, and a quarter of a pound of tea.

A Lincolnshire assizes Willingham George Mitchinson, bank manager, of Spilay, was sentenced to five years' penal servitude for embezzling £10,000 which he lost in stock exchange gambling.

A discovery has been made in the neighborhood of Haverill, Suffolk, of a number of fossil remains of mammoth hippopotamus, and bison. The bones were found in a brick pit, evidently an old river bed.

Cornelius Vanderhilt, named Catchpole, was to have appeared at Camberley police-court for discharging a revolver on the highway, but committed suicide by shooting himself with the revolver.

The Dublin main drainage scheme, which has already cost £300,000, and which has largely to be completed the work under way, will be a failure unless £20,000 more is spent in remedying a defect in the construction of the precipitation tanks.

There was an extraordinary scene of disorder in Phoenix Park, Dublin, on a recent Sunday. An organized crowd of rowdies hooted a military band which was playing selections of music and the band was compelled to leave.

On one or two occasions recently persons of the same class hissed the National Anthem.
