He was out for a quiet drowse on bank or in boat and the rod, and line were only excuses. there came a tug and the evidence was indisputable that something had been hooked, the dear old philosopher took another swig at the bait, said "Dear me! How annoying!" and then got out and tied his line to a tree. It's a mighty strong fish that can pull a tree up by the roots although, if we believe what the fishermen say, such things have happen-At any rate Izaak Walton never ran against a fish of that sort, or he would have put it on

This, we may take it, was the true Waltonian way of fishing, and it had advantage-it didn't interfere with his thinking. The Walton style is still affected by the great majority of fishermen, who believe that the fish are a secondary affair, so long as a man can eatch a few comforting thoughts. What, pray, is reflection save fishing for happy ideas? Fishing for them is much pleasanter than digging for them and sweating for them, as many slaves of the lamp have to do to this day. And the thoughts that are fished for are so much better and brighter than the other kind. They are redolent of nature, of blue skies, and rath suns, and burnished rivers, and whispering verdure. The other kind have the mark of the pick and the curse of gold on them. But fishing ! What is more delectable than to stretch at full length on the bottom of your skiff, with the tented sky overhead, and the wimpling waters around, and then to dream? What a keen sense of detachment from the world! What a lotos drifting with the tide! But you need warm weather for that,
