But the most staggering blow is the result of the North eeds election, which, ever since the electoral epoch of 1886, has returned nothing but unionists, and where now the formidable government majority of 2,500 has been converted into a hostile majority of 700. The election was fought entirely on the question of free trade and the education bill. No more emphatic verdict could have been given, and the liberals are beside

themselves with joy. Mr. Chamberlain made an academic reference to the imperial conference, yesterday, tending to minimize the importance of the proposals under discussion. Deadly Illuminating Gas. It is asserted by a writer in American medical weekly that cases of poisoning by illuminating gas are on the increase, and he attributes this to the use of the so-called water gas stance as practically to exclude water gas from use was repealed about thirteen years ago, says Succe that time there have been 459 douths from inhalation of gas, while in period of equal length preceding the repeal of the law there were only eight deaths from this enuss. Carbon monoxide is not only fatal in large quantities, but it produces a general condition of ill bealth in very slight proportions, and the writer believes that many puzzling eases of decline in physical vigor are to be attributed to almost inappreciable gas leaks.
