SWORD FOR KITCHENER The Presentation Was Made In London AT THE HOTEL METROPOLE GIFT OF CORPORATION OF CAPE TOWN. Sir Joseph Dimsdale Spoke of the General as a Model Englishman, a Higher Title Than Decoration or Rank Could Bestow—A Brief and Modest Reply. London, Aug. 1.—At the dinner given in the Whitehall rooms of the Hotel Metropole, last evening, the occasion being the presentation of a sword of honor to Lord Kitchener, the guests numbered over 200, including Gen. Ian Hamilton, French and Brabant; Sir Wilfrid Laurier, prime minister of Canada; Mr. Barton, prime minister of the Australian commonwealth, and Mr. Seddon, prime minister of New Zealand.

HAZARDOUS EXPERIMENT. To Subject King to Fatigue of Coronation Ceremonial. New York, Aug. 1.—The London Tribune's cable says: Optimism regarding the coronation is slowly reviving under effects of the surgeons' bulletins and forecasts from medical journals. Whether the king's will is imperious or medical advisers consider it necessary to humor him, there is a determined effort to subject the patient, who is barely able to make one or two turns on the deck of the royal yacht, to the effort and fatigue of the coronation ceremonial. Motives of state prevail although an ordinary patient would not be fit for so hazardous an experiment in a few weeks after a most serious operation.

THE DREAD EPIDEMIC RAGES IN Manchuria. St. Petersburg, Aug. 1.—Official returns show that cholera is spreading with terrible rapidity throughout Manchuria. The epidemic now claims numbers of victims daily, mostly Chinese, but Russian and other Europeans are dying the disease. At Inka between June 6th and July 15th there were 334 cases and 650 deaths, and at Harbin, since the recent outbreak, 1,463 cases and 939 deaths have been reported. At Mukden there were 49 deaths out of 76 cases in eight days, and at Port Arthur 67 deaths out of 109 cases in eighteen days.

NO BEER; NO CHURCH. Prohibition Pastor Has a Strike on His Hands. Chicago, Aug. 1.—Austin people are leaping that it is a difficult matter to build a church without beer. The congregation of the first Baptist church of that suburb have money and materials in plenty, but are beginning to fear they never will get that church up. Why? No beer! The head of the anti-beer campaign is Rev. Clarence T. Tapp, pastor of the church to be built. He is upheld by the leading members of his congregation. Wednesday the campaign came to a climax. Pastor Tapp found workmen in the church quenching their thirst with a case of contraband liquor. Without a word he seized the box and threw it out of the window. Then the workmen struck. The gang was discharged.

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THE PRICE OF LUNCHESES. There is a Good Advance in New York. New York, Aug. 1.—When the clerks, book-keepers and other patrons of the quick lunch rooms in the downtown districts of New York had satisfied the inner man with the usual mid-day repast yesterday, they were pestered with pay checks which were five or ten cents in excess of the usual amounts. This was a result of the combination recently formed by the restaurant proprietors to control prices, which became effective to-day. Staple dishes, such as ham and beans have been raised from ten to fifteen cents, and the prices of sandwiches, cakes and the other articles of food usually found on the lunch counters have been increased in proportion. The proprietors justify their action on the plea that it was made necessary by the increased cost of meats and other supplies. Investigation, however, fails to sustain the truth of this statement. On Park Row, opposite the post office, stands a modest little all-night "beanery," which, despite its apparent insignificance, is one of the best known places of the kind in the metropolis. The founder of this place retired some years ago after having made a fortune of \$500,000 from the sale of beef and beans at ten cents a plate, and the present proprietor, who refused to enter the new combine, says he expects to emulate the example of his predecessor, and that, too, without any increasing of prices.

SHARP CONFIDENCE TRICK. Bostonian Cheated out of \$2,500 by Fakirs. Boston, Mass., Aug. 1.—The story of a confidence trick in which the victim lost \$2,500 was told in police court, and as the result Frank Bornstein was held to the grand jury on the charge of larceny of 500 \$5 coins on July 16th, from Bernard Bennett, of this city. It was in evidence that Bennett was induced by Bornstein and a confederate to go into a plan to counterfeit English sovereigns. He furnished 500 gold coins, which the other men apparently placed in a tin can, and into which a strong acid was poured. After considerable juggling of the can Bennett received it to carry home. He grew suspicious, and concluded that it was an infernal machine. A policeman opened the can and \$9.97 in pennies came out. Bennett had Bornstein arrested, but the other man escaped.

ACCIDENT ENDS JOY. Coach Struck by Trolley Car—Fifteen Injured. Denver, Col., Aug. 1.—Fifteen persons were injured on a trolley car which was struck by a trolley car and overturned last night near Alameda and Pearl streets. Mrs. L. A. Horton, Denver, and C. J. McMillan, the bugler, received injuries which may result in death. The others, most of whom were tourists, were not seriously injured, although several of them were painfully bruised and all were badly shaken up.

MANY DIE IN MINE. Twenty-Seven Bodies Recovered—Hundred Entombed. Sydney, N.S.W., Aug. 1.—An explosion resulting in heavy loss of life occurred at the Mount Kimball colliery at Wollongong, a port forty miles from here. Twenty-seven bodies have been recovered. The buildings at the mouth of the pit were wrecked. One hundred and forty-nine miners were rescued, but a hundred are still entombed. It is feared their release is hopeless. A portion of the colliery is on fire.

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NEWS OF THE WORLD. What Comes To Us From All Quarters. CONDENSED PARAGRAPHS. TELEGRAMS FROM THE FOUR QUARTERS OF THE EARTH. Matters That Interest Everybody—Notes From All Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered By The Dear Public. The yearly report of the Intercolonial railway shows a surplus of \$80,052. A second train with 500 of the returning Canadian troops left Halifax at six o'clock on Thursday evening. Several hundred colored people from various points in Ontario will celebrate emancipation day at Hamilton to-day. The viceroys of Sze-Chuan telegraphs that messengers have occurred at Jen-shou, Essupantang, Kuan-yintang and Kranscutchi. Lieut. Parenzel, has been expelled from an Austrian Hussar regiment because he did not use his sword on a laborer who struck him. Ex-Alderman Gillespie, formerly of Stratford, but lately car foreman at Rimouski, Que., has been appointed to a similar position at Battle Creek, Mich. At the liberal league banquet Lord Rosebery warned the liberals against dissociating themselves from the imperial aspirations of the nation and supporting home rule. An injunction has been issued against President Mitchell and other officers of the Miners' union on the ground that they conspired to prevent the operation of certain coal mines. An improved equilibrium between revenue and expenditure has been established in Jamaica and the direct steamship service between that island and Great Britain has proved satisfactory. The Westminster city council has decided that the Canadian arch must be removed immediately after the coronation, and has approved of the offer of a resident of Lucknow, to erect an Indian coronation arch.

REACH MONTREAL. Some of the Steamer Cestria's Passengers Arrive. Montreal, Aug. 1.—The first train carrying the Canadian Mounted Rifles, which returned from Africa on the Cestria, arrived from Halifax shortly after seven o'clock this morning in a train of seventeen cars, the party numbering about 1,000. Some of them immediately took western trains leaving the city soon after their arrival, but the greater portion evidently intend to stay here and see the sights before going home. As soon as they got off the train they scattered in groups through the city. There was no demonstration of any kind organized owing to the expectation that the train would reach the city between two and three o'clock this morning.

THAT GAMBLING SCANDAL. Department Confirms Report—Will not Give Name. Ottawa, Aug. 1.—The Free Press says: "Enquiry at the militia department elicits a confirmation of the story that one of the officers of the 2nd C.M.R., who came from Western Ontario, has been deprived by the war office of his war gratuity and medal, because he was found playing with marked cards in South Africa. The department will, however, make no announcement of his name as yet." A report to the department states that the officer in question won the enormous sum of £1,000 on the Royalin Castle on the way to South Africa. The officer took his discharge in the Transvaal.

Vienna, Aug. 1.—Dr. Setton, a professor in the Protestant theological faculty of the Vienna university, who recently discovered one of King Solomon's castles, has been discovered by the war office of his war gratuity and medal, because he was found playing with marked cards in South Africa. CHARGED WITH ROBBERIES. Use of a Spring Gun Leads to his Arrest. Chester Depot, Vt., Aug. 1.—By the use of a spring gun C. H. Waterman, a local mill proprietor, it is claimed, has revealed the person guilty of a series of robberies which have been going on in this town and vicinity for several years. The alleged robber is Clarence Adams, one of the most highly respected young men of this section. He is under arrest and in his home, it is claimed, a large quantity of stolen property has been recovered.

CHICAGO GAS COMPANY BEATEN. Chicago, Aug. 1.—The right of Chicago to compel the People's gas, light and coke company to furnish seventy-five cent gas was sustained in a decision handed down in the United States circuit court. An injunction had been filed by the gas company to restrain the city from enforcing the city ordinance passed by the council in October, 1900, fixing the maximum charge for gas at seventy-five cents per 1,000 cubic feet. The injunction was dismissed.
