

Already 9,000 Families Placed Back on Land.

Pretoria, Aug. 2.- Excellent progress is being made in resettling the Boer farms. Awady 9,000 families have been reinstated on their lands, although the work of replacing the farmers . has been accompanied by many difficulties, especially in securing and feeding horses and cattle. Much complaint was caused by the military authorities auctioning off live stock, which was brought up by speculators who re-sold at large profits at the expense of needy farmers.
