A very profitable hour was spent from 3 to 4 p.m. in a session of spiritual conference and prayer, Rev. Dr. Antill presided, and several of the brethren took part.

FRONTENAC CHEESE BOARD.

Bidding Was Brisk and Good Prices Realized.

Kingston, Aug. 7.—Bidding was quite brisk at to-day's session of the Frontenac cheese board, opening at 9 a.m. and closing at 9:45 a.m. The buyers were out in force, those present being: L. W. Murphy, D. J. McKinnon, O. C. Bissell, J. Crawford, J. Alexander, R. Thompson, W. J. Crandall. The boardings were small, amounting to only 1,500, of which 455 were white and 1,015 colored. The entire boardings were bid for and with one or two exceptions, all factories sold. These factories had cheese on sale.

The entire offerings were bid in at 9:45 a.m., at which price these sales were recorded:

L. W. Murphy—Arigan, Cataraqui, Forest, Thousand Island, Granite Hill, Farmers' Friend, Howe Island, Elginburgh, Wolfe Island.

O. C. Bissell—Emerald, Rose Hill, Sand Hill, Frontenac.

The two or three factories refusing to sell on the board were later bought up on the curb.

G. H. Banbury, inspector, laid a letter before the board, to the effect that in his tour through Kingston district he had come across many instances where patrons persisted in sending milk to factories in old, rusty and foul cans; in some cases milk is unstrained. These patrons are as liable to a fine as those guilty of watering or skimming their milk. On his next trip, if he does not find an improvement, he will prosecute those who are guilty. He also warned cheese-makers to brush up a bit in their work.

SAYS, "KEEP AWAY"

From Manitoba, Unless You Have a Written Contract.

Cataraqui, Aug. 7.—(To the Editor): As the farm laborers' excursion to the North-West will soon leave, it would be well for those intending to go to understand the labor situation there.

Last year it was reported that 20,000 men were wanted at high wages, but when they got there they incurred quite a different story. For the first month those who got jobs worked for little or nothing, and none of them were wanted at wages, but that could have been obtained in Ontario without incurring the expenses or hardship of a trip to the west.

There is another important fact to be taken into consideration. The enormous emigration will materially lessen the help required this year, and as they have no where to harvest, they will be available to help in the grain fields. The C.P.R. have also limited the passage to Winnipeg with the proviso that if you hire them you will be given a ticket to the point where you are hired.

Resolved, That the Anglers' Association is unalterably opposed to any legislation licensing the netting of eel fish in the waters, bays and creeks of the St. Lawrence river and we call upon all representatives in senate and assembly representing districts bordering upon the St. Lawrence to oppose any and all measures permitting such netting.

C.; Walter Fox of Berlin, Aug. 7.—Enormous frauds on the part of municipal authorities have been discovered in the town of Maria-Theresienopolis, Hungary. A sum amounting to 1,800,000 kroner (\$300,000) has disappeared from the city chest and the misappropriation of between 5,000,000 and 6,000,000 kroner has been traced to fourteen officers, who have been arrested.

Finally Charles R. Skinner presented a set of resolutions which were carried, thus ending the discussion. They followed:

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
