He is a Scotsman by birth, having been born in Dundee in 1838, and reaches his sixty-fourth year in November. Both he and his brother are prominent in City of London financial circles, and as the minister responsible for the drafting and carrying through parliament of the act creating the London county council when he was president of the local government board he is closely identified with London's special interests. He entered the house of commons in 1874 and was first given office as secretary to the admiralty in 1885. He was president of the board of trade from 1895 to 1900, and was transferred to the home office at the beginning of the present parliament.
