He looked very tired as he left, but he smiled pleasantly to the people from his Cinderella coach by the side of his ever young and, I repeat, more seautiful than ever consort.

I have not the bump of veneration highly developed, but I stood mute when I entered the Abbey and saw that blaze of thousands of uniforms glittering with gold and thousands of beautiful women in court dresses, peers and peeresses of the kingdom with their red velvet gowns and train and coronets; these princes and princesses whose trains, ten yards long, and made of most glorious gold and ifver materials, each carried by page and ladies of honor in dresses gorgeously contrived.

But especially I was amazed when looked at the details of that venerable editice built for William the Conquerer; that world of after-thoughts and chapels and cloisters, with its nooks and corners, its stones that belong to all ages of the nation; stones of its lisping childhood, stones of its ighting and cruel youth, stones of recolution, stones of barbarity, oppression and conquest, stones of progress and civilization.

All of them seem to have tengues for the illustrious and gorgeous company that is assembled in this edifice. which company," of English people, know so well how to cling to the past as a tree clings to its roots.

Then the Holy Bible was presented to him. a benediction and Te Deum were sung, and the enthronization took place, after which homage was paid him by princes, peers, archbishops and so on, and King Edward was allowed to

The queen being crowned, all the precesses put on their coronets.
