Son Intervenes to Save Trouble Between Parents. Ottumwa, Iowa, Aug. 15 .- To pre-

vent his mother being murdered by her drunken husband, attacking her with a knife, John Sims shot and killed his father, J. H. Sims, on his farm near Fussey, forty miles north-west of this city, vesterday. Sims was wealthy stock raiser and well-known throughout the country. The killing was the culmination of a condition of allairs which has existed in the family for many years. Sims had always been a kind and thoughtful, husbandand father when sober, but when under the influence of liquor almost invariably displayed a homicidal mania, his violence being directed against members of his own family.
