A man may not take up with this or that notion or scheme of reform for moment holding public attention, and he may proclaim his religious beliefs and hopes from the housetops, but his whole life, both public and private, may be governed and controlled and animated by the highest sense of duty and the deepest religious motive. To say that a man cannot be a Christian in politics is simply nonense. Montreal Star. Alexander McLaren, M.P., was one of the passengers who came home on the Tunisian. He was in the old country about two months, but like many others he was much disappointed in being eventually compelled to return without seeing the coronation.

"I was much struck," says Mr. Me Laren, "with the progress Canada has made in impressing herself on the people of Great Britain. When I was over there four years ago everything from this side was called 'American.' Now you hear people everywhere saying they 'will give the preference to Canadian goods. The thing to do now is to keep it going. Let us spend money on advertising. If we don't the feeling in our favor will gradually grow dull. We are not doing enough in the way of commercial agents. Ontario should have an agent general in London. Another thing that should be impressed on the Canadians is that more care must be taken in packing goods. Fruits, for instance, must be packed in finer style and small pack? ages, if the best price is to be got for them. As to articles sent to England in cold storage, one thing I noticed was the lack of proper facilities for handling them, after they reach the old country. This is especially true in hot weather. Cheese or butter sent across the ocean in cold storage, is cound to deteriorate if dumped into hot warehouses or piled on the wharf. This is a matter which calls for a remedy, although fortunately the weather is not often hot enough to make


