G.T.R. Improvements. The Grand Trunk Railway company is spending \$1,000,000 in improving the line between Toronto and Port Hope. New tracks are being laid, and much regrading done. The Scarborough steep grade has been reduced one per cent. At Rouge, the new grade was laid by ninety feet, and one at Whitby six feet. All along the road east of Scarborough there has been a tremendous amount of work done, both in cutting away and in filling in, which has resulted in getting rid of several level crossings for overhead bridges and general improvement in every way. The roadbed is in excellent condition. Heavier rails are being laid.
