JOINED BY CUPID. CZAR'S COUSIN TO WED SON OF A GREEK. London, Aug. 25.—Little is being talked of in Russia and Greece, but the marriage of the Grand Duchess Helene, the czar's handsome cousin, to Prince Nicholas, third son of the Greek royal house, which will take place at Krasno-Selo on Friday.

The bride-elect is the only daughter of the Grand Duke Vladimir of Russia, between whom and the throne there stand only two lives—those of Nicholas II and his younger brother—and the czar's hearty approval of the alliance is looked upon as guaranteeing the future of the Greek kingdom.

Grand Duchess Helene, with her good looks and her dowry of 5,000,000 rubles, though she is only twenty, has received court from more than one scion of a royal house, and not long ago she stood an excellent chance of becoming queen of Spain. She was once engaged to Prince Max of Baden, but the match was broken off in order that she might espouse Prince Louis Bonaparte, who was in love with her and whose chance of becoming emperor of the French were then thought to be rather good. For some reason or other, however, nothing came of this.

It is doubtful if Helene could have discovered a more desirable husband than Prince Nicholas, who is thirty, well favored and well built and an officer in the Greek army. But he is most notable for attainments which are rare among royal personages. He is a playwright and an artist. Comedies written by him have won public competitions at the University of Athens and afterward been produced with success. Visitors to his father's court, too, seldom leave without being presented with sketches of themselves hurriedly done but with rich skill by the versatile prince.

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MORGAN MUST END STRIKE

HANNA FEARS THE FIGHT WILL BE LONG. The Steamer New York Had a Slight Accident.

There was some excitement among the 500 passengers when the steamer New York rubbed against a shoal of Grinnell Island, a mile above the Thousand Islands Park, on Saturday evening, about six o'clock. The steamer had proceeded but a short distance from the wharf, and was creeping slowly through the shallow and shoal-surrounded channel leading outward. She got a little inside the buoy, and Capt. Miller backed her up to get on the outside. Then the New York went slowly ahead, but unfortunately came a little too close to the hidden shoal. Her port wheel and portion of that side struck it, and the steamer lurched a couple of times, and then continued her course. The excursionists on the saloon and hurricane decks did not get as excited as might be expected, and when they found that the steamer had simply touched a shoal, they resumed their seats, without any flurry. On the main deck, the lurching caused more excitement, and one woman fainted.

The collision knocked a couple buckets of the wheel, but no damage was done to the hull. At the Thousand Islands Park, on account of the New York's wheel being a little out of order, her passengers were transferred to the steamer Islander, which continued the trip to Alexandria Bay, and then returned to Kingston, arriving about midnight, and bringing the Kingston and Cape Vincent excursionists, who numbered about 300.

Some of the Thousand Islands resorts are too shallow and intricate approaches for large excursion steamers like the New York to get through, and captains of such boats do not relish landing at them. In this case the New York simply grazed the shoal. That her hull is a strong one has been amply proved. She is put down by the marine inspector as one of the staunchest river excursion boats in the province, since being rebuilt last spring. The New York is really a new boat, being built only fifteen years ago.

Mexicans Find Buried Treasure. Uvalde, Mex., Aug. 25.—A party of fifteen Mexicans unearthed at Clines an iron vault which, when opened, revealed a great pile of Spanish gold coin. The money was counted and found the spot in the presence of reputable citizens. The latter said the find amounted to more than \$100,000. It is asserted that the money was buried by a paymaster of the Mexican army during the war with Texas.

The Crisis Is Over. Winnipeg, Aug. 25.—The weather of the past two days has been most gratifying to farmers and beneficial to the crops. "Hot and dry" has been reported, and to-day news from the west indicates a continuance of the same conditions. The stage is now passed, according to local authorities, and frost now creates few fears.
