EXPERIMENTS AT ONTARIO AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE.

The Wheat Came Through Winter Well-Damage Done by the Hessian Fly Was Very

Winter wheat experiments occupied one hundred and eighty-eight plots at college, and six hundred and three plots throughout Ontario in 1902. On the whole, the wheat came through the winter well and the yield De of both grain and straw was, satisfactory. The weak strawed varieties were badly lodged, and, owing to the wet weather, some of the grain was sprouted before it was harvested. The damage done by the Hessian fly was very slight, the plots at the college being practically free from ravages of

this insect in 1902. Ninety-five varieties of winter wheat were grown at the college this year. The ten varieties giving the greatest vield of grain per acre, starting with the highest, were as follows: Extra Early Windsor, Dawson's Golden Chaff, Imperial Amber, Pedigree Genesee Giant, Prize Taker, Economy.
