AFRAID OF THE DEBT. A contemporary has this to say of a neighboring town :

"In Lindsay, Ont., by-laws to raise \$20,000 for good roads, \$14,000 for a public school building and \$2,000 to purchase a site for the Carnegie library building have been snowed under by popular vote. These leans would have cost Lindsay about (\$1,500 a ear. In return, good streets, a fine school and a public library/ Lindsay which which has been pretty stagnant evidently intends to remain so."

The good roads, the school building and the public library may be desir able, but all may not be necessary and the fate of all has been settled by the reference of them to the vote at the ore time.

The people have become rebellious against high taxation. They realize that it does nor pay. A city and a town cannot be boomed into activity or prosperity. Their location may be against their growth, and public grants only add to the general de pression. Sometimes a lively agitation, too, induces the electors to de what they afterwards regret. This has been the case in Kingston, where pub lie enterprises have been all too freely helped and with the effect that the city is carrying a load of debt-a debt out of proportion to its progress and income-and the people are feeling the burden of increased taxation.

So that it is not a sign that Lindsay is without public spirit when it defeats a money by-law which would add more than is necessary to the public debt. Nor is the defeat to b accepted as an intimation that Lind say will not meet its requirements in another way. The people are simply chary of the public credit, and they are to be commended for it.
