

People used to crowd the bar-room to see old Carncross pay for his beer." The operation consisting of the unwinding of several yards of string from his leather wallet in the remotest corner of the room, taking out a nickel, always the exact change and slowly winding his pocket-book up again. Then he would pay, jump into his buggy and drive home as fast as the horse could go. to re The hermit always slept with hi gun, revolver and club by his side and he never left the house without the gun. Neighbors feared him and ' none dared address him. The interior of his house was poor and filthy. In one corner of his living room stood an old bed and the remnants of a dirty red quilt. In another was an old stove and Judgment was given at Osgoode there were a few ricketty chairs scattered about. From this room the pantry opened. Its shelves contained a conglomerate mass of rubbish covered that they came out of the holes and looked boldly at the intruders. The other room on the lower floor was the hermit's dairy.
