

Northern Pacific Passenger Molest Passengers.

BERS WERE FOILED.

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 27 .- A westbound Northern Pacific passenger train was held up at Sand Point, Idaho, sixty-five miles east of here. Monday night. The robbers, of whom there were seven, forced the engineer to stop the train, after which they uncoupled the baggage car.

Then they compelled the engineer at the point of a revolver to pull up the track about three miles further, where they tried to wreck the baggage car with dynamite. The explosives failed to work and after spending fifteen minutes with the car the robbers decamped, allowing the engineer to go back to the train with his engine. Two other bandits had guarded the train, keeping the passengers inside by firing revolvers along the sides.

Practical Working.

London, Aug. 27 .- One of the most way company upon a system of lines starting from Milan. The main branch goes from Milan to Gallarate, twenty-five miles, and thence start three eparate branches which supply the Lago Magiore region, with lengths of sixteen, nineteen and twenty miles. The main line passes through a densely populated region and the traffic is constant throughout the year, while the three branches supply the tourist traffic, which is considerable in th summer and autumn. In order to meet the competition of the local tramway lines the company was obliged to change its system. Since the new system was inaugurated last October, the passenger traffic has increased fifty per cent. The energy is supplied by a hydraulic and steam plant. The hydraulic plant is under construction. A fall of twenty-five feet is obtained by a canal, which delivered 140 cubic vards per second, representing 11,600 horse power. The main turbines generate 1,200 horse power; and the dynamos 742 kilowatts. The steam plant will be used as a reserve when the hydraulic station is finished; it has three ngines of 1,400 horse power, which drive triphase alternators. The latter give 13,000 volts at twenty-five versals. From the station the current is transmitted at high tension, and these supply the five sub-stations for the road, where the current is transformed to 420 volts direct current and fed into the third rail. The rolling stock consists of twenty motor cars and twenty trailers, of fifty-five feet length. The motor cars hold seventy-five passengers, and the trailers ninety; the former have four Thomtake current from the side rail by four sliding contacts. 
