London, Aug. 30.-The Times says Edward and William V. Casev, Buenos | field in the United States. Edward Casev said: United States is at present the world's butcher, but the increasing demands of its own population and the decreasing supply of cattle will eventually force tile American packers to devote themselves exclusively to the home market. Then will be the time that Argentina will demonstrate the inexhaustible productiveness of its virgin soil. Whether ally ourselves with the United States or not, we shall certainly give it a fight for a profitable British market, which is de endent on North and South American meat for nine months of the year. The chilled meats of Argentina and the United States can be sold in Great Britain at a profit of sixty per cent., while the demand excee is our capacity."
