Public sympathy was with him, for few believed that he should ever have been there, and ever since great efforts were made to have him pardonea. He has served three years and nine months, equal to five years, with the good behaviour al lowance, and there was no more mo ael prisoner in the penitentiary than Robert Mackie. He has come forth free from the evil influences which constantly surround men when they are amongst criminals, a bright and straightforward fellow. Mackie is somewhat run down, particularly during the past few weeks, but expects to regain his former good health after a few weeks' rest. For over two years
