SCHEME IS A BENEFIT. Market Lessee Is Supported by the Committee.

With reference to the new arrangement of tables in the island market, Alderman White, chairman of the city property committee, states that he had nothing whatever to do with the arrangement; the market lessee made the change and then asked for the chairman's approval. Alderman White considered the change an improvement but before expressing himself he consulted several members of his committee, who approved of the new scheme, whereupon the chairman confirmed it.

The scheme which the market lessee has in view is the separation of the buyers from sellers; he desires to keep the buyers on one side of the table and the sellers on the other. In explanation thereof, he states that he is continually being defrauded of toll by frequenters of the island market, and he desires to put a stop to the illegal practice. All sorts of schemes are resorted to by these people to save payment of toll. As the lessee has the permission of the property committee to make the change, he will have the tables properly fitted and fastened, so that they cannot be moved. The committee finds that the proposed scheme of marking the tables in squares, charging toll for each square occupied, is not feasible, as the tables are too narrow. The lessee's proposed arrangement is a decided benefit to the purchasing public.

The Late Mrs. Halladay. Brockville Recorder. The community in and around Elgin were shocked to hear of the death of Mrs. Dorothy Halladay, who lived at the old Halladay homestead at Halladay's Corners, near Elgin. While death was not unexpected, yet her long residence in this vicinity and her extensive acquaintance caused a general exclamation of "Well, Aunt Dorothy is gone." She was tenderly cared for in her last illness by her two daughters and sons, and everything possible done to relieve her from her severe suffering. Her removal leaves a void in the community that a pious Godly woman has gone to her reward, but that her works and example during life will continue to live. She was at the time of her death seventy-six years of age and leaves behind three sons and two daughters, Elmer J. Halladay, a farmer near Athens; Elkins V. Halladay, a cheese manufacturer near Elgin; and Clinton X. Halladay, a farmer upon the homestead; Angela, wife of Joel Laibley, Toronto, and Ina, wife of Thomas Johnston, at Clear Lake.

End Of McGroarty's Place. New York, Sept. 5.—After an existence of nearly half a century John McGroarty's cafe, adjoining the Academy of Music in Brooklyn, is to be closed for good next week. The site has been purchased for the erection of a large office building. Politicians of both parties have made McGroarty's a resort that is known from one end of New York State to the other. McGroarty himself was a member of the assembly twenty years or more ago, and is known to politicians in all parts of the state. In his place, in years gone by, burning questions of state and nation have been discussed by men of power who were his patrons. Hugh McLaughlin once was accustomed to meet his friends from up the state there, and Jacob Worth, when he ruled the Kings county republican organization, met his counsellors in McGroarty's. Other men of fame who have discussed political questions over the cafe tables include Grover Cleveland, Samuel J. Tilden and Daniel Lamont.

Pious Fund Arbitration. The Hague, Sept. 5.—The international arbitration tribunal which is to decide Pious Fund claims case between the United States and Mexico met today and formally organized. The arguments will be begun about ten days hence. Those in attendance are Sir Edward Fry, of England, and F. DeMartens, of Russia, arbitrators for the United States; T. N. C. Asser and Savornin Lohmann, of Holland, arbitrators for Mexico, and counsel who will conduct the arguments for the two parties to the dispute. The American counsel consists of Judge William L. Penfield, solicitor of the state department; Jackson H. Ralston, agent for the United States; Walter S. Penfield, and Henry V. Ames, assistant counsel. The Catholic church in America, which is vitally interested in the case, is represented by Archbishop Riordan, of San Francisco, and Garret McEnerney, the archbishop's attorney.
