BERBER TRIBE ROUTED. Great Loss of Life in the Engagement. London, Sept. 12.—A dispatch from Felix Morocco, to The Times, says the Berber tribe, General, near Mekinas, was attacked September 4th, by a combined movement of troops and utterly routed with great loss of life.

WHO FIRED THE SHOT? St. Thomas, Ont., Sept. 12.—James William Freeman, the six-year-old adopted son of D. B. Freeman, of Aldborough, was found dead on Tuesday and apparently had been killed by the accidental discharge of a gun while he was fixing or handling the weapon.

PREMIER ROBIN LI. Winnipeg, Sept. 12.—Hon. R. P. Robinli, the provincial premier, is ill at his residence. His doctor has forbidden him to go on business, or even to talk to those who call upon business.

POEM BROUGHT \$450,000. London, Sept. 12.—The absent-minded Pezzani's Hospital, built at Alton out of the fund collected from the sale of R. G. Lang's poem, has been handed over to the war office. The building, together with the hospital, on which it stands, cost about £90,000.

WAS OPPOSED. Attitude of Canadians Towards Resolutions AT CONFERENCE WHICH WANTED TO COMMIT CANADA TO ACT. To the Maintenance of Military and Naval Armaments—What Canada May do in the Fast Atlantic Service—Cost Will Not be Heavy.

NEW RIBBON ISSUED. But Old Incorrect Pattern Must Be Returned. Ottawa, Sept. 12.—Through an inadvertence an incorrect pattern of ribbon was issued with the colonial auxiliary forces long service medals (not decorations) recently distributed to Canadian militia officers and men.

London, Sept. 12.—In a despatch from St. Petersburg the correspondent of the Daily Mail relates that the commander of the Cossack station at Wotchnick, anxious that his district should show a preponderance of males, has ordered that the father of every girl baby born in the district shall receive fifty strokes with the knout.

MISSION REPORT. Laid Before the Methodist General Conference. Winnipeg, Sept. 12.—The report of the mission committee outlining the work of officials under the new principle of mission management, was given by Mr. Young to the Methodist general conference, yesterday afternoon. It suggested that the corresponding secretary for Manitoba, the North-West and British Columbia conferences be elected by general conference and be supported out of the general mission fund.

COALITION GOVERNMENT. Preferable to Party Rule Without Working Majority. Toronto, Sept. 12.—The Globe this morning, in discussing "The Ontario Situation," makes the following significant and suggestive comments: "The question whether one party or the other, or a combination of both, shall furnish the ministry, is of some interest, but the main thing is that the government shall be in a position to administer the affairs of the province without losing its time in vote-hunting."

Time passed, and there was no wedding. Now news has been received in Chicago that Winters has won both a bride and the cigars, with ten days to spare. But it took an eloquent to do it. The bride was Miss Maud Hatley, who for some time has made her home with her sister, Mrs. F. W. Deaver, 3,622 Ellis avenue. She is from Kincardine, Ont. Winters travels for the R. G. Gunning company, and is said to be the son of a wealthy Louisville citizen. The couple eloped on Sunday night, and were married in Toledo, Ohio, on Monday.
