THE BOARD MET**TO RATIFY TEACHER'S APPOINTMENT**

And To Transact General Business—Salary Will be Easily Arranged—The Inspector's Report.

A special meeting of the Board of Education was held last evening, trustees Meek, Godwin, Lauturey, Shaw, Elliott, McIntyre, McElveen, Martin, Lambert, Fee, Oram and Morrison being in attendance. In the absence of Chairman Sears, Dr. Fee was chosen presiding officer.

Communications Considered.

The following communications were read and referred to the respective committees:

From the W.C.T.U. secretary, in reference to the intended visit to the city of A. W. Beall, M.A., the society's provincial lecturer in the purity department, and asking the board to arrange for his meeting the boys of the various school classes.

From M. Dunn, St. Catharines, re contributing to a national monument to the memory of the Canadian heroine, Laura Secord.—Referred to management committee.

From T. J. Rigney, on behalf of the sisters of the Congregation de Notre Dame, asking the consent of the city to their pupils using physical appliances at the Collegiate Institute for experimental purposes.—Referred to management committee.

From the Hon. Clifford Sifton, federal minister of the interior, acknowledging receipt of resolution of thanks passed by the board for a supply ofatholes.—Fyleo.

Moved by Mr. Meek, seconded by Mr. McIntyre, that Mr. Beall be allowed, on behalf of the W.C.T.U., to co-operate with the teachers of the city in advancing purity among the pupils of the public schools. Mr. McElveen held that the schools should be used for no other purposes than the work prescribed by the educational department. The board, however, were in full sympathy with Mr. Beall's work, and readily passed the motion.

Public School Inspector Kidd presented the following report on the re-opening of the schools: The attendance was large and there was overcrowding in many of the senior classes. The over-crowding has been removed, but there is still a large attendance in two of the kindergartens, in the Junior Third classes, in three of the Junior Fourth classes and in some of the Senior Fourth classes. The total number of pupils in attendance to-day is 2,243. There are twenty-eight pupils in the new kindergarten classes recently opened in Sydenham school. Since the re-opening 114 new pupils have been admitted to the schools, of whom twenty-five are the children of parents who have recently come to live in the city.

Mr. Godwin requested the inspector to prepare a report showing how many pupils who pass the entrance examination do not go on to the Collegiate Institute.
