IN LAST DAYS

Sure The World Is Nearing An End SIGNS THEY SEE BELIEF OF THE SEVENTH DAY ADVENTISTS.

They Are Stirring Western Citizens by Their Prophecies—Upon What They Base Their Predictions—The Believers Are Generally Model Citizens.

Lincoln, Neb., Sept. 17.—The Seventh Day Adventists again are stirring parts of the west by their prophecy that the end of the world is close at hand.

The Adventists do not fix any definite date for the end of the world. They base their prediction upon the prophecy of Daniel, in which it was said that in 2,300 days the sanctuary would be cleansed.

The mistake of the Adventists of 1844 pertained to the nature of the event then to occur and not to the time, they say. What took place then, they believe, was the beginning of the world's judgment.

Matthew says the social world will be in the last days as in Noah's day and the innumerable crimes of the day are quoted as confirmation.

The Adventists all dress plainly, eschewing gold, jewels and rich attire, and are generally model citizens.
