CHURCH UNITY

METHODIST GENERAL CONFERENCE FAVORS IT

Winnipeg, Sept. 18.—The committee on church union presented its report of the Methodist general conference, recommending that the conference declare itself in favor of a measure of organic unity, wide enough to embrace all the evangelical denominations in Canada. The report was adopted and a broad resolution passed authorizing negotiations with the Presbyterian and Congregational churches, with that in view, appointing a strong committee to meet representatives from those denominations, and to report at the next general conference.

CROWN PRINCE OF SIAM.
Copenhagen, Sept. 18.—Prince Choma Maha Vajiravudh, the crown prince of Siam, now visiting the King of Denmark, will embark at Southampton on October 3rd, on the steamer Furst Bismark, for New York. He will spend two months in the United States and Canada.

DR. BARCLAY'S ANSWER.

Will Meet Deputation To Visit Gananoque.
Montreal, Que., Sept. 18.—Rev. Dr. Barclay, of St. Paul's Presbyterian church, stated to-day that it would be several days before he could give an answer to the offer of the principal-student of Queen's university, which will be offered to him by a deputation, which he expects from Kingston this evening. There are lots of things, he says, which require consideration before coming to a decision. Queen's offers him \$4,000, and as his present stipend is \$7,000, acceptance will mean a reduction of \$3,000 per annum in his income.

Hon. J. I. Tarte has accepted an invitation of the manufacturers of Gananoque, Ont., to visit that town on the 24th inst., to inspect the manufacturing establishments at that place. He will be tendered a reception and banquet.

Officers of the Canadian Medical Association were elected to-day as follows: President, Dr. W. M. Morehouse, Toronto; vice-president, Prince Edward Island, Dr. James Warburton, Charlottetown; Nova Scotia, Dr. John Stewart; New Brunswick, Dr. W. C. Crockett; Fredericton, N.B., Quebec, Dr. Mercier; Montreal, Ontario, Dr. W. P. Cayen, Toronto; Manitoba, Dr. McConnell; Morden; North-West Territories, Dr. J. T. Rafferty; Calgary; British Columbia, Dr. C. J. Fagan, Victoria; general secretary, Dr. George Elliott, Tyrone; treasurer, Dr. H. B. Hill, Ottawa; executive committee, Drs. Moore, Eccles and Wisart, all of London, Ont.; London, Ont., was selected as the place of meeting for next year's convention. A resolution was adopted suggesting to the Dominion government that the time is opportune to establish a separate department of public health under one of the existing ministries.

Circulars have been issued quoting the rates for the New Canadian steamship line to South Africa and if the existing rate was between the lines running from New York it is soon ended as at present seems probable as one steamship agent claims that the Canadian rates will be the lowest in existence. At present the cut New York rates are lower than the Canadian figures, but the steamers are losing money at them. A few of the rates for leading commodities are as follows: To Cape Town, four, oatmeal, etc., in bags, twenty-one shillings, 19 shillings lower than the regular New York rate; lard, beef, etc., in barrels, 39 shillings; cheese in boxes, condensed milk, etc., 59 shillings; beans, peas, etc., in bags, 25 shillings; potatoes, apples, flour and meal in barrels, 3 shillings.

RUSSIANS TO OPEN FIRE.

Czar's Gunboats Ordered to Sink American and Japanese Sealers.
London, Sept. 18.—In a despatch from Odessa the Russian minister of agriculture and state domains, M. Yermoloff, has announced that he has taken effective measures for the suppression of the Canadian sealers. The operation of sealers and Japanese sealers among the seal and other sea animals on the north-east coast of Siberia. Although anxious to comply with the reiterated representations of Russia, the Washington and Tokyo governments have failed to put an end to this illicit fishing in Russian waters. M. Yermoloff, continues the correspondent, now gives formal notice that American and Japanese sealers captured within the limits of Russia's maritime jurisdiction on the Siberian coast will be liable to three months' imprisonment and their ships and cargoes to confiscation.

AN OPEN SWITCH

Responsible for Accident at Maberly Station.
Perth, Sept. 18.—A railway accident which occurred at Maberly this morning, resulted in the death of fireman Ross, of Havelock, and the destruction of four freight cars, a baggage car, and an express car. Engineer Rose, of Havelock, had two ribs broken, and another fireman, named Gordon Peters, was badly shaken up. None of the occupants of the passenger cars were injured, other than receiving a severe shock. Fireman Ross, who was killed, is survived by a wife and family of two.

IMMIGRATION TO CANADA.

Revised Figures for the Year Ending With June 30th.
Ottawa, Sept. 18.—The revised official statistics of immigration to Canada during the year ending June 30th last will be published shortly. They will give a total of between 65,000 and 70,000 immigrants, of whom 22,000 come from the United States. William McCreary, M.P., for Selkirk, has arrived in the city on departmental business. He is enthusiastic over Manitoba's crop, and the rapidity with which the west is being settled. Mr. McCreary heartily endorses Hon. Clifford Sifton's stand in regard to the tariff, and states that the west is looking for a reduction rather than any increase in duties.

About School Attendance.

Since the opening of the present school term 176 new pupils have been admitted by Inspector Kidd. Mr. Kidd was appointed to his present position in 1876. The reports issued by the minister of education reveal a big growth in the school attendance since that time. In 1875 the daily average attendance at the public schools was 1,095; last year it was 2,122, the attendance having almost doubled. In 1877 the reports show an average attendance at the separate schools of 623; in 1900 the average had fallen to 556.

WOULD LYNCH CLERK

Shoots His Wife and Narrowly Escapes Death by Spectators.
New York, Sept. 18.—William D. Grady, a clerk in the Jersey City post office, shot his wife, Rose Agnus Grady. The woman probably is fatally wounded.

Losses His Summer Home.

Tarrytown, N.Y., Sept. 18.—The residence of John D. Rockefeller at Roseton, N.Y., was destroyed by fire on the 12th inst. The fire is supposed to have started from electric wires. None of the family was at home. The estimated loss is \$10,000.

NEWS OF WORLD

TELEGRAMS FROM THE FOUR QUARTERS OF EARTH.

Matters That Interest Everybody—Notes From all Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

Formal demands for higher wages were nearly every ferry company doing business in New York. The engineers want a twenty-five per cent. increase on October 1st.

Alexander Morey, Brockville, a stonemason, for many years a resident of Brockville, alarmed his wife by his heavy breathing. She called to him, but got no response, and the next moment he passed away. Aged sixty-seven.

David Hayden, a veteran of the civil war, ran amuck at Essex, Conn. He shot and probably fatally wounded two most prominent citizens, and when the authorities were about to capture him, blew the top of his head off with a shotgun.

A London news agency says the Norfolk and North American Steam Shipping company, owning nine steamers, trading between England and the United States, in connection with the Lehigh Valley and Reading railroads, has been taken over by the Morgan shipping combine.

In connection with the plans for strengthening the fortifications of Kingston, Jamaica, it is announced that the British war department has decided to augment the garrison by 500 men. When plans are completed the harbor entrance will be commanded by six remodelled forts mounting most modern guns. Work is now being pushed.

CHEESE GOES UP.

Price Reaches 10 3-16c. on Board To-day.
Kingston, Sept. 18.—On the Frontenac, Cheese Board to-day 4,280 boxes were offered for sale. Of this number 765 were colored and 515 white. The following factories boarded their make: Colored—Arigan, 40; Emerald, 30; Forest, 70; Glenburnie, 10; Glenvale, 85; Granite Hill, 70; Maple Leaf, 60; Pine Hill, 90; Parham, 55; Tichborne, 30; Elginburg, 70; Wolfe Island, 75; Frontenac, 30. White—Craw Lake, 25; Cold Spring, 70; Hartington, 60; Howe Island, 25; Hinchinbrook, 25; Model, 60; Silver Spring, 60; McGrath's, 80; Gwendover, 40; Collins Bay, 60.

The feature of to-day's board was the high price offered. Last week the highest bid was 92c., but to-day the price soared to 103-16c. The best price this year was 11c., which prevailed for a few weeks in early spring. At to-day's good price the salesmen were ready to let their cheese go, and nearly every factory sold. The following sales were recorded: To Alexander-Arigan, Crow Lake, Glenburnie and Tichborne. To Murphy-Cold Springs, Forest, Model, Elginburg, Wolfe Island, and Collins Bay.

WRECKED THE BANK.

And Incidentally Killed Himself in the Operation.
Seattle, Wash., Sept. 18.—A special to the Times from Skagway, Alaska, says, yesterday afternoon an unknown man walked into the Canadian Bank of Commerce, a revolver in one hand and a dynamite bomb in the other and demanded \$20,000, threatening to blow all to eternity.

TURKEY BACKING DOWN

Russian Torpedo Boats May Pass Through Dardanelles.
Constantinople, Sept. 18.—A ministerial document has been issued suggesting that the demand made by Russia that four unarmed Russian torpedo boats be allowed to pass through the Dardanelles, may be permitted under certain reservations. The question now awaits the decision of the sultan.

Kills Widow and Himself.

Tamaqua, Pa., Sept. 18.—His love unrequited, Peter Shaffer, a miner, shot and killed Mrs. Anna Lloyd, a widow, and then ended his own life by sending a bullet through his head. Shaffer had been a suitor for the hand of Mrs. Lloyd for some time past, but he received no encouragement.
