In British shipping circles it said positively that a meeting, which will be held in the course of a fer days, will determine the future of the amalgamation.

In Liverpool there is doubt expressed as to Morgan's ability to complete the purchase of the White Star line, which, as Bruce Ismay has been sisting, is still in the hands of English company. By a clause in agreement, Morgan has to pay interest at the rate of five per cent, upon the purchase price until the purchase is completed, which is something like £10,000 a week.

The Liverpool Post says: "There is reason to believe that, contrary public opinion, the last thing in world Morgan desires or intends to become owner of an Atlantic fleet His more modest ambition is to an honest broker, who for a consideration buys a fleet from one company and sells it to another.
