Life Produced By Chemicals.

Another scientific experimenter has been working along the lines of Prof. Loeb, of Chicago, in the effort to find a material formula of the life principle. In a recent report to the committee of the National Academy of Sciences, Dr. Loeb told how by sprinkling a few drops of ferric chloride of potassium on a thin layer of gelatin he could cause it to start into life a collection of cells having a regular polyhedral form and containing a nucleus, a sack of protoplasm and a membrane exactly like that of plant or animal cells.
