AS DEATH, SAYS DR. C. W.

Result of Fifteen Years of Investigation - Can He Restore Life ?-Tried Method on Cats, Dogs, Monkeys and Other Lower Animals.

Indianapolis, Ind., Sept. 24.-Dr. C W. Littlefield, of Alexandria, who for fifteen years has been pursuing his investigations on the vital principles of life, experimenting with cats, dogs. monkeys and other lower animals, has made known the result of his work. He makes the assertion that he can restore life. He asserts that the principle of life, in substance, is volatile magnetism. In demonstrating his theory the doctor employs a solution. of saline origin, with salt as the basis, saturated with oleo resin and exposed for several hours to an atmosphere of free ammonia.

Having secured this saline solution. Dr. Littlefield reduces it to a powder. It is this powder that he has employed throughout his long course of experiments.
