ETNA IS WORKING.

Catania is Flooded, Sicily Storm-
swept By Tornadoes.

London, Sept. 27.—A despatch from
Rome announces that a severe tor-
nado has swept Catania, on the east
coast of Sicily. Catania is flooded,
and many houses have been damaged.
The railroads have suffered seriously.
The tornado has wrought havoc at
Modica, a town of Sicily thirty miles
from Syracuse, where several persons
were killed.

The Spanish ministry, on the other
hand, fearing complications with the
French government, inclines towards

THEOSOPHISTS TO MEET.

Chicago, Ill., Sept. 27.—Many dele-
gates and visitors are arriving for the
sixteenth annual convention of the
Theosophical Society of America,
which opens to-morrow. The conven-
tion, the most important of its kind
ever held in this country, will be at-
tended by the representatives of the
society from different parts of the
world, and by delegates from all over
the United States, Canada, Mexico
and the Hawaiian Islands. The general
reports to be presented to the con-
vention will show that the growth of
the theosophical movement continues
at a gratifying rate.

**POLICEMAN RELIEVED FROM DUTY
FOR ALLEGED REMARK.**

Indianapolis, Sept. 27.—Jesse Streit,
a bicycle man on the police force, was
suspended by Superintendent Tate and
charges formally preferred against him
to the Board of Public Safety for ex-
pressing "the wish that President
Roosevelt would die." It is charged
that he said to several policemen, after
the president was taken to the
hospital, that he wished the president
would die. When his words were re-
ported his star was taken from him.

THEOSOPHISTS UP IN ARMS.

Claim Britain is About to Des-
crape Their Mecca.

Los Angeles, Cal., Sept. 27.—Anan-
garan-H. Dharmapala, Buddhist repre-
sentative in America, has arrived from
Ceylon en route to London. He has
addressed a communication to the
American people, calling their attention
to what he terms "the courageous
action of the British officials" in
Ceylon, in threatening to desecrate the
ancient shrines in the sacred city of
Anuradhapura, which is to the
Buddhists as great a Mecca is to the
Mohammedans or Jerusalem to the
Christians.

LEAVING THE OLD FARM.

AUGUST 27.—Reports from the
provinces, especially Telephones, he-
sorb in continuous exodus of emi-
grants for the United States. The fig-
ures show that \$300,000 emi-
grants have left this year, of whom
70,000 were women. The unfavorable cur-
rent harvest has acted as an incen-
tive.

A SEVERE SENTENCE.

Paris, Sept. 27.—Commandant Le
Roy Iagur, of the 14th infantry, who
was arrested on a charge of failing to
obey an order to close unauthorized
schools, has been found guilty by a
court martial and condemned to dis-
missal from the army. The vote was
six to one in favor of dismissal.
