### LONDON NEWS

#### Failed to Interest Charles M. Schwab.

#### JOIN INTERESTS

#### RUSSIA AND MANCHURIA TO BE CONNECTED.

Direct Communication Between Manchuria and Principal Russian Cities—Wishes to Establish New Trans-Atlantic Line—Perpetuates Old Prejudices.

London, Sept. 27.—The Manchurian Railway company, says a St. Petersburg correspondent, has arranged to secure the co-operation of Russian railroad and steamship companies in the establishment of direct communication between Manchuria and the principal Russian cities. Representatives of the various companies, appointed to consider the question, have decided to cooperate with the Manchurian company under the same conditions as those regulating the direct Anglo-Russian passenger traffic.

Through communication will be established, uniting the principal stations of Manchuria with the chief places on the Siberian railway and a number of cities of Russia. Through tickets will be issued between St. Petersburg, Moscow and Warsaw, and Shanghai and Nagasaki. Provision will be made for the through transportation of goods from Odessa to places on the Manchurian line by sea to Port Arthur, and thence by rail.

A special from Aix Les Bains says: "M. Isnard, deputy for Brest, and secretary chamber of deputies, had a long interview with Charles M. Schwab, Isnard has been working for more than ten years on a project to establish a trans-Atlantic line between Brest and New York. He wished to have Schwab's support in the enterprise, and said that by saving ten hours in crossing, the new line would do away with all others leaving from Havre, Cherbourg, etc. Mr. Schwab, although much interested in Isnard's plans, refused to have anything to do with them for good reasons, the first and most important being that, belonging to the steamship trust, he would be running in competition with his own interests. He also said American opinion in general is opposed to French steamship lines, on account of the French, trains, which rarely connect with incoming or outgoing steamers, and they would object much more to eight hours from Paris to Brest than to ten hours more at sea."

Published reports, says a Tokio correspondent, show that the new Chinese educational system is modelled closely on Japanese lines, but a leading Japanese journal strongly condemns the Chinese government's failure to secularize education, thereby perpetuating old prejudices.

A Paris correspondent says Chateau Grignon, closely associated with Mme. De Sevigne, or rather, what the revolution left of it, is about to be sold by auction.

The criticisms on the efficiency of the London fire brigade have resulted, according to the Daily Mail, in the decision on the part of Capt. Wells, chief officer of the brigade, to resign.

### MASCAGNI COMING OVER.

The Famous Italian Composer to Visit America.

London, Sept. 27.—The American liner Philadelphia, which sailed from Southampton for New York to-day, has among her passengers Pietro Mascagni, the famous Italian composer, who is to pay his first visit to America, a land of which he is a deep admirer, as is expressed in a hymn—*To Mascagni*, which he has just completed. Mascagni's orchestra and opera company have preceded him to the United States, having sailed from Genoa a few days ago. The great composer will be heard first at the Metropolitan Opera House, New York, where he will conduct an orchestra concert, to be followed by a performance of "Cavell."

### PEARY GIVES UP THE POLE.

Has Decided to Make no Further Endeavors.

Portland, Me., Sept. 27.—Lieut. Robert E. Peary, in an interview, says: "On no account shall I make an effort to return to the north. I have done all that could be done with the facilities at my command, and shall now resume my duties in the navy, reporting to the department at Washington in a few days. In coming back this time I have abandoned the pole. The pole can be reached. It is a question of money and of the explorers' outfit. I have done all that I could have done had I been equal to the requirements I could have made the pole."

A transient sharper, dressed as a laborer, took in two Chatham, Ont., merchants by means of forged cheques for \$12.50 and \$11 respectively. The discovery of the value of the cheques was not made till they were presented at the bank.

Rev. John H. A. Hagan, of the Catholic church of St. Paul of the Cross, Jersey City, N.J., wrote a letter, published in a local paper, declaring that he was in favor of Sunday baseball, providing the game is played in an orderly manner.

The "Huron, Lake Erie, and Pacific" Railway is now completed from Port Barwell to Ingersoll, and connects with the Wabash, the Grand Trunk, the Michigan Central, and the Canadian Pacific. This road has a charter for an extension to Collingwood.

Rev. Henry S. Gately, rector of Trinity church, Wasaw, N.Y., has declined the call recently extended to him to take charge of St. Thomas church, Brooklyn, Mass. His salary at present is \$1,000 a year. He has been offered \$6,000.

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A cablegram from the Siamese minister at Washington indicates that the crown prince of Siam has again advanced the date of his visit to America. The despatch states that he will sail from Southampton October 3rd, on the Fuerst Bismarck.

**BUDDHISTS UP IN ARMS.**

Los Angeles, Cal., Sept. 27.—Anagarika, H. Dharmapala, Buddhist representative in America, has arrived from Ceylon en route to London. He has addressed a communication to the American people, calling their attention to what he terms "the courage and patriotism of the British officials" in London, in threatening to desecrate the Angkor Wat in the sacred city of Anuradhapura, which is to the Buddhists as great as Mecca is to the Mohammedans, or Jerusalem to the Christians.

**Sues Vancouver Hospital.**

Vancouver, B.C., Sept. 27.—Allan Parr, of Ottawa, the well known hockey player, has entered suit against St. Paul's hospital for \$10,000 damages. While delicious from typhoid fever, at the hospital, Parr rose from his bed and jumped out of a window, twelve feet to the ground, and ran two blocks before the Sisters of Charity could get help to capture him. Parr sustained severe injuries in his mad leap.

The National Congress of French miners in session at Commeny, has called a message of sympathy to United States miners now on strike.

Two children of A. D. Wolferton, Hartford, Conn., visiting friends at Windsor, Ont., have disappeared and it is feared they have been kidnapped.

By the will of the late Charles F. Macdonald, formerly consul of the United States at Hamilton, Ont., \$2,000 is bequeathed for the improvement of the money order system of the United States.

Four stock men were killed and five seriously injured in a rear-end collision between a stock train and a passenger train on the Burlington near Maiden, Ill.

Frank Higgins, convicted for the murder of William Doherty, at St. John, N.B., will be sentenced on October 7th. Counsel for defence will move for a new trial.

A new coal field has been discovered on Lord Dudley's Staffordshire estate, England. It is estimated that the field will yield 1,500 tons daily for a period of eighty years.

Operations in the beef houses of Armour & Co., Chicago, have been effectively tied up by 150 laborers, who went on strike for an "increase" of twenty-five cents a day in wages.

Harold Heimendinger, New York, who tried suicide by shooting himself in the abdomen, inflicting a wound like the late President McKinley's, had eight perforations instead of two, till recovering.

Lois A. Brewster, the handsome youth accused of the murder of Clarence Foster and "Dimples" Lawrence, has been sent up for trial by the Suffolk, N.Y., grand jury. Public opinion is decidedly against the prisoner.

Justice David J. Brewer, of the United States supreme court, was quite badly burned about the face and hands at his summer home at Thompson's Point, Lake Champlain, last evening. He was using gasoline to burn some brush.

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#### \$11,000 DUG UP.

#### Package Containing Large Sum is Found Near Alexis.

Toledo, O., Sept. 27.—Two young men, who gave their names to a local constable as George R. Miller, of Philadelphia, and Henry Armstrong, of New York, dug up a package containing a little over \$11,000 near Alexis, a small town north of here. The money is believed to be a portion of large sums taken in a couple of recent bank robberies. The men declined to make a statement, only saying to enquirers that it was treasure buried by an old miser some years ago. The money looked fresh and crisp, however.

#### HOPED HE WOULD DIE.

#### Policeman Relieved From Duty For Alleged Remark.

Indianapolis, Sept. 27.—Jesse Stroff, a bicycle man on the police force, was suspended by Superintendent Tule and charged formally preferred against him to the Board of Public Safety for expressing the wish that President Roosevelt would die. It is charged that he said to several policemen, after the president was taken to the hospital, that he wished the president would die. When his words were reported his star was taken from him.

#### Theosophists To Meet.

Chicago, Ill., Sept. 27.—Many delegates and visitors are arriving for the annual convention of the Theosophical Society of America, which opens tomorrow. The convention, the most important of its kind ever held in this country, will be attended by the representatives of the society from different parts of the world, and by delegates from all over the United States, Canada, Mexico and the Hawaiian Islands. The general reports to be presented to the convention will show that the growth of the theosophical movement continues at a gratifying rate.

#### Pay Director Putnam To Retire.

New York, Sept. 27.—The navy will lose an able and popular officer in Pay Director Edwin Putnam, general stockkeeper of the New York navy yard, who reaches the retiring age of sixty-two years tomorrow. He has seen a quarter of a century of service and will retire with the rank and pay of rear admiral. He holds one of the very important positions at the navy yard and because of the scarcity of pay directors in the service he may be retained in charge of the office for a few months until his successor can be selected.

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### ALL TREATED ALIKE.

#### Rumors Not Well Founded—Want Bill Dropped.

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#### AMERICAN IMMIGRANTS.

#### Over 28,000 Have Entered Manitoba Territories.

Winnipeg, Sept. 27.—The official figures issued show that from the beginning of this year down to August 31st over 28,000 persons from the United States entered Manitoba and the territories as permanent settlers. It is expected that by the end of the year the number will exceed 35,000. The total immigration from all countries, including the older provinces, will exceed 60,000 for the whole year.

#### Result of Anti-Canteen Law.

Washington, Sept. 27.—Brigadier-General Funston in his annual report of the department of the Colorado, declares that the recent anti-canteen legislation of congress was duly dismissed, the discipline of the army, ruined scores of good soldiers and enriched saloon-keepers, gamblers and dissolute women. His report announces a deplorable increase in offences, particularly desertion, attributable by him to the abolition of the canteen and garrison life restrictions of men returning from field service.

#### The Case Dismissed.

Cobourg, Ont., Sept. 27.—The West Durham Dominion election trial came off here this morning before Chief Justice Falconbridge and Justice Street. E. C. S. Huyck, K.C., of Cobourg, appeared for the respondent, Robert Beith, M.P., no one appearing for the petitioner, James McCormick. The case being called on no evidence offered, the petition was duly dismissed, thus confirming Mr. Beith in his seat for the remainder of the parliamentary term.

#### To Improve Prisons.

London, Sept. 27.—In a despatch from Fez, Morocco, the correspondent of the Times announces that the Sultan has carried out his promise, to improve the conditions of the country, the work of cleaning and draining the prisons and of supplying the inmates with better food is already in progress.

#### The Lisgar Election.

Winnipeg, Sept. 27.—At the fourth day of the trial of the petition to unseat G. A. Stewart, M.P., for Lisgar, the principal witness was James Riddell, M.P., for London, who testified that he treated a number of voters on election day. He denied any knowledge of bribery, however. Two more voters admitted yesterday that they had received \$5 for their votes.

#### Leaving The Old Farm.

Athens, Sept. 27.—Reports from the provinces, especially Peloponnesus, describe a continuous exodus of emigrants for the United States. The official figures show that \$900 emigrants have left this year, of whom 250 were women. The unfavorable current harvest has acted as an incentive.

#### A Severe Sentence.

Paris, Sept. 27.—Commandant Levois Lapierre, of the 49th Infantry, was arrested on a charge of having given an order to close unauthorized schools, has been found guilty by a court martial and condemned to dismissal from the army. The vote was six to one in favor of dismissal.
