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and Speed in the shibboleth of the passing hour and will we end this tremendous drama like Icarus, who invented wings with which he might fly to Heaven, but the jealous gods, angered at his ambition, melted the wax upon the wings and dashed him to pieces upon the globe which he had spurned? The manifestation of our present politics is not alluring, there is something rotten in Denmark when men like William S. Devery can come to the front as the exemplars of political virtue and uprightiness. This brings us face to face with the corner stone upon which the temple of our liberty stands. The vote of the wrong criminal that ever darkened the walls of our state prison is equal to that of William Waldorf Astor, Andrew Carnegie, J. A few prominent politicians got up a petition to the governor, it was signed by people of high and low degree without reflection. The governor wanted to succeed himself and, urged by intimate political friends, he signed the decree which liberated Sol Somer and he went forth from St. Quintan, a free man, privileged to exercise the highest prerogative of the highest and noblest citizen that tremendous instrument the freeman's ballot.
