Trying to Complete Negotiations With France.

New York, Sept. 30.—The Tribune's London cable says Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. Mr. Fielding, the Canadian minister of finance, are expected to return to London, from Paris, by the end of the week. They are making a final effort to complete negotiations for the improvement of trade relations between Canada and France.

But the young couple did meet, although none was the wiser, and at least one carriage drive was taken after the paternal edict had gone forth.

This occasion was behind a fast team drawing a closed carriage, which stopped at the residence of Rev. George Ward, at Vermillion, a few miles east of Oswego. Jermyn and Miss Kehoe were married there on June 2nd, 1899.

Then began the keeping of the secret, which was successful. John Jermyn left \$10,000,000, and by the terms of the will Walter Jermyn will receive one-fifth of this—and he's got his bride already.

MISS ALICE HAY MARRIED MR. WADSWORTH.

Newbury, N.H., Sept. 30.—Though the wedding to-day of James W. Wadsworth, Jr., and Miss Alice Hay, united two of the most distinguished families of America, the function itself was characterized by extreme simplicity, in striking contrast to the lavish display seen at most of the last day weddings of any note.

Less than one hundred guests, and nearly every one of them a relative of one or the other of the contracting parties, witnessed the ceremony, which was performed in the drawing-room of "The Fells," the country place of the bride's parents, Secretary of State and Mrs. Hay, on the shores of Lake Sunapee. After a short wedding trip Mr. and Mrs. Wadsworth will go to Genesee, N.Y., to spend the rest of the autumn at the country estate of the Wadsworth family.

MISS ALICE HAY IS THE SECOND DAUGHTER OF SECRETARY OF STATE AND MRS. HAY. Her sister, Miss Helen Hay, was married last February to Harry Payne Whitney, son of William C. Whitney. Unlike her sister, Mrs. Wadsworth has not inherited her father's literary genius. She is fond of reading and is thoroughly appreciative of good writing, but she made no attempt to win laurels on her own account. She is tall and stately, with the rich dark coloring notable in her mother. Her hair is almost black. She is fond of athletic sport and is an expert equestrian, golfer, fencer and tennis player.

MR. WADSWORTH IS THE SON OF REPRESENTATIVE AND MRS. JAMES WADSWORTH OF NEW YORK, and was a classmate and intimate friend of the late Adelbert Hay. He frequently visited the Hay home during his college days and his knowledge of his bride of to-day dates back to the time when she wore "pig tails" and short frocks. The young folks wanted to be married two years ago, but both families advised the delay.

THE EDUCATION BILL REMAINS A SOURCE OF POLITICAL DISTURBANCE, WITH A SEARCHING OF HEART IN EVERY FACTION.

THE NON-COMFORMISTS ALONE ARE THOROUGHLY OPPOSING THE MEASURE, BUT THEY DIFFER AMONG THEMSELVES RESPECTING THE WISDOM OF THEIR LEADERS IN ADVOCATING A GENERAL REFUSAL TO PAY RATES IF THE GOVERNMENT PERSISTS IN IMPOSING IT.

THE IRISH NATIONALISTS, WHO HAVE BEEN SUPPORTING THE BILL, ARE NOW THREATENING TO OPPOSE IT BECAUSE MR. WYNDHAM IS NOT REGARDING THE COERCION ACT AS A DEAD LETTER.

THE LIBERALS ARE EAGER TO DISCREDIT THE GOVERNMENT AND FACILITATE THEIR OWN RETURN TO POWER, BUT THE ASTUTE POLITICIANS AMONG THEM DO NOT DESIRE EITHER THE DEATH OR THE ABANDONMENT OF THE EDUCATION BILL FOR THEY WOULD BE COMMITTED IN THAT EVENT TO A SETTLEMENT OF A MOST TROUBLESOME NATURE.

THE CONSERVATIVES ARE EXPOSED TO THE RISK OF ALLEGING THE SUPPORT OF CHURCH MEMBERS. THE GOVERNMENT SUPPORTERS, WHILE SERIOUSLY EMBARASSED BY THE AGITATION AGAINST THE MEASURE, ARE HOPEFUL THAT A COMPROMISE CAN BE EFFECTED THROUGH THE GOOD OFFICES OF THE OPPOSING LEADERS AND THE CLERGY OF THE ENGLISH CHURCH. MODERATE CHURCHMEN ARE SUGGESTING THAT THE CHIEF DIFFICULTY CAN BE REMOVED BY RESTRICTING THE RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION TO THE BIBLE AND THE AUTHORIZED CATECHISM AND BY EXCLUDING RITUALISTIC MANUALS AND OTHER EXTREME WORKS.

THEY CONSIDER THAT THE QUESTION OF AUTHORITY COULD BE EASILY SECURED IF THE SCOPE OF RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTIONS WERE STRICTLY LIMITED FOR EVERY RELIGIOUS BODY.

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
