A substitute for coal, at something like a reasonable figure, will keep discomfort and suffering from many homes this coming winter, and prove a great boon and blessing to all our people. That peat does and will make an extremely good substitute for coal is believed by many and the fact of its use being recommended by such an authority as T. W. Gibson, director of mines for Ontario, ought to have some weight with those who may be incredulous as to its utility. Peat, we are told, is selling at \$3.75 a ton at Beaverton, but the question of the hour is who will bring it to Kingston? Some of our dealers are entirely sold out of that precious commodity, coal, why not stock up with the next best thing-peat ?-G. M.
