SHARPE'S TRIAL.

MANSLAUGHTER CASE BEFORE ASSIZE COURT.

Eric Sharpe Being Tried For Causing the Death of Beatrice Holland in Frontenac School Last April.

At Tuesday afternoon's sitting of the high court, the hearing of the Sharpe manslaughter case was begun.

On afternoon of April 25th last, Eric Sharpe, a pupil in the junior fourth class of Frontenac public school, in company with several comrades, was in the cloak-room of the school at four o'clock.

The case began at half-past one o'clock. To the indictment of manslaughter, the prisoner pleaded "not guilty."

Jessie Morrison stated that Beatrice Holland was sitting on a box. When Eric came in, she got up and knocked off his hat.

Police Sergt. Snodden told of the prisoner entering the police station on the evening in question to surrender. The lad gave his age as fourteen years.

Police Detective Aiken testified that he had heard the prisoner admit to his father that he had shot the young girl, but didn't know why.
