Sale of horses on Market Square by Mur- HIS PLANS WILL NOT BE AFFECTED.

> The United States Has the Supreme Control of the Directorate of the Atlantic Shipping Combine - The Cost to the Cunard Company.

London, Oct. 3.-The publication of the details of the Atlantic shipping combine has caused no little surprise here. It had been generally expected that Mr. Morgan would have been included in the list of directors, and the absence of his name provokes much comment. It is also noticed that the United States has a majority on the supreme directorate, and that Engexecutive and finance committees. Moreover, Sir Clinton Dawkins, who is chairman of the British committee. is a partner in the London house of J. P. Morgan & Co.

Many people of influence in shipping circles are veering round to the opinion that the Cunard deal with not se riously affect Mr. Morgan's plans. the two new Cunard ships cost £1 000,000 each, the Cunard company wi have to pay the British government at two and three-quarter per cent an annual interest of £55,000, so that the subsidy will really only amount to only £95,000, per annum This amount is not considered cessive and, yesterday, the Cunard company's shares fell back to the price at which they stood before the announcement of the new agreement with the government.

Mr. Morgan's reported attempt to arrange a deal with the Great Western railway, which is the largest, al though not the wealthiest, line England, is being keenly discussed. Many tradesmen express the hope that there may be a substantial foundation for the rumor. They do not sire to see Mr. Morgan in possession the ground. of the railways of this country, but would welcome .almost any velopment that would lead to the smashing of the railway ring of the United Kingdom.


