New York, Oct. 3.—The effects of the coal strike are certainly being felt in New York as in no other city. There is no denying the fact that this city will have to face a real famine this winter, unprecedented in its history.

MORGAN'S AIM.

HIS PLANS WILL NOT BE AFFECTED.

The United States Has the Supreme Control of the Directorate of the Atlantic Shipping Combine—The Cost to the Cunard Company.

London, Oct. 3.—The publication of the details of the Atlantic shipping combine has caused no little surprise here. It has been generally expected that Mr. Morgan would have been included in the list of directors, and the absence of his name provokes much comment. It is also noticed that the United States has a majority on the supreme directorate, and that Englishmen are rigidly excluded from the executive and finance committees.

Company Boring For Oil on Strength of a Dream. Poughkeepsie, N.Y., Oct. 3.—A corporation capitalized at \$3,000, which has as its principal asset a charge of the oil near Millerton.

He Wedded Daughter of a High Official. Pekin, Oct. 3.—Prince Chun, brother of the emperor, who recently visited Germany to apologize on behalf of the Chinese government to Emperor William for the murder of Baron von Ketteler, the German minister at Pekin, by Boxers, married, on Tuesday, a daughter of Grand Secretary Young-Lu, who is the highest official in the empire. High officials deny a report that the marriage is intended to provide an heir for the throne in place of Pu-Chun, who was deposed from the position of heir presumptive a year ago.

CHURCH AND DIVORCES. Davenport, Ia., Oct. 3.—Bishop Theodore N. Morrison, in a circular letter just issued, has sternly and fully of the Iowa Episcopal church and laity that hereafter he will not go behind the record of the courts in divorce cases.

Declines Increase. Lincoln, Neb., Oct. 3.—Chancellor E. Benjamin Andrews will remain at the University of Nebraska at his original salary of \$5,000 a year. Last summer when it was reported Madison had proffered the presidency at Madison to Dr. Andrews, the Nebraska regents advanced his salary to \$6,000, the regents, declining to accept the increase, giving as his reason his knowledge that economy is necessary in the management of the university.

Ready For Veterans. Washington, D.C., Oct. 3.—The national capital is being decked out in gala attire to an extent seldom before known in her history. From one end of the city to the other, on every hand, workmen may be seen putting up a bewildering array of bunting, flags and streamers, until the eye is ached with the varied display.

Upheal Decision. Dublin, Oct. 3.—The Birr county court has upheld the decision of the High Court in the case of Edmund Haviiano Burke, M.P., and Michael Reilly, M.P., and chairman of the Birr rural district council, who had taken an appeal against the sentence imposed September 24th of five months imprisonment at hard labor upon conviction of intimidation, but requested Mr. Burke's sentence to one month's imprisonment and omitted the hard labor in the case of Mr. Reilly.

Look For Stork's Visit. London, Oct. 3.—The Princess of Wales will not assist the queen at the court functions of the early winter in view of the fact that an addition to the family of the heir apparent is expected about Christmas time. The ever-growing family of the Prince of Wales has necessitated a larger country home than that heretofore occupied in Norfolk, and consequently a new establishment is to be set up on the Hill House property, recently purchased for the Princess of Wales, and which is close by his country abode and within halting distance of Sandringham.

Both newspapers will now have a chance of proving their assertions as, yesterday, the Quebec bridge company sued both papers for \$10,000 each.

A Counter Charge.

Toronto, Oct. 3.—John Birnie, K. C., counsel for W. H. Brown, of Col-lingwood, charged with conspiracy to murder his mother, is in Toronto. The defence desires the arrest of John Rose, the insurance agent in the case, and that Brown's case will go to show that Rose is actually the guilty party. Brown's contention will be that he approached Rose to have the insurance policy cashed and that the latter planned the murder by which a much larger sum of money would have been obtained.
