



People often declare that the newspaper is largely given over to stories of crime. That this is an erro may be seen from studies made by John Cotton Dana of the Newark, N.J., library. He estimates that in America three billion copies of daily publications are read in a year, with over a billion copies of weeklies, 263,402,000 of monthlies. He has computed the space devoted to different subjects; 11 per cent, is given to commercial, financial and allied subjects, such manufacturing and real estate news; only 4 per cent, is devoted to crime; legal matters get 6 per cent and ath leties 7 per cent.; political questions occupy 8 per cent., society 2 per cent. and general gossip and trivial matter


