ARE ALARMED.

BOARD OF HEALTH ASKED TO INVESTIGATE CAUSE.

Diphtheria Abounds in Locality Adjacent to Earl and Sydenham Streets—Number of Cases Reported—Five Ill From One House.

Chairman McIntyre summoned a special meeting of the Board of Health Tuesday afternoon, to consider the question of attempting to prevent a spread of diphtheria in the vicinity of Sydenham and Earl streets, which is causing so much alarm to the residents of the neighborhood.

Prof. Walter Pike. "The decision of the city council to repeal the by-law levying a \$50 license fee upon the butchers," said Ald. Graham yesterday, "justifies the course I have been pursuing during the past year. I have moved times and again for a \$2 fee, but the council shut me out. Now they have adopted just what I advocated. They have eaten crow, and it must have been pretty hard for them to do it." Citizens express themselves as very much pleased at the reduction of the license.

Suggests Amalgamation. A prominent retired resident, during the course of a conversation, advocated an amalgamation of the offices of city clerk and police magistrate. "It would be practicable," he declared, and would save the city just \$1,400 a year. And surely, in our present non-too-good financial condition, the citizens would welcome such a saving. 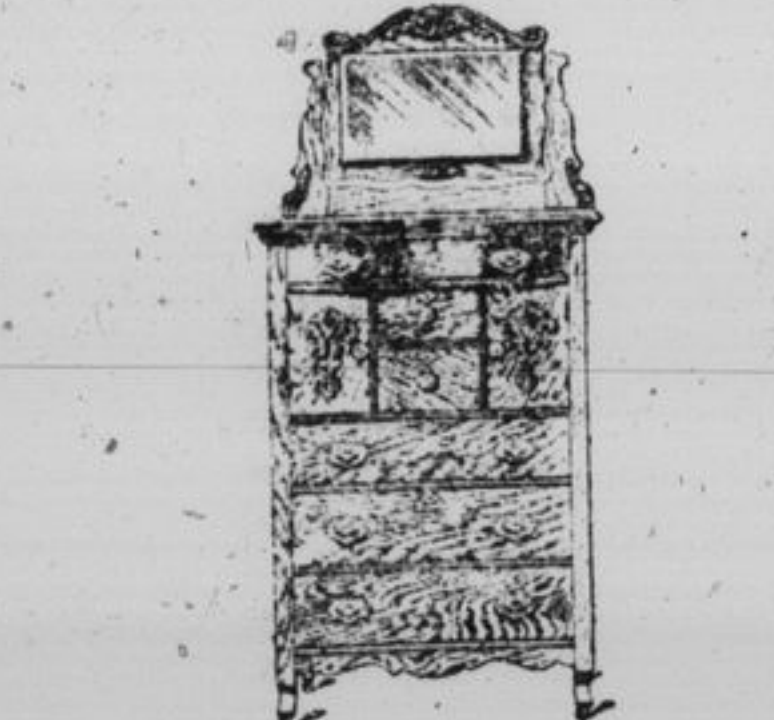
