WILL ACT SOON.

Prince Ching To Be Brought To Senses.

AN OPEN DOOR WILL BE MAINTAINED ON YANG-TSE-KIANG.

Russia Has Greatly Transformed Manchuria—China-men Seem to be Intruders—The Massacre of Missionaries Must be Atoned For.

London, Oct. 22.—Sir Ernest Sartov's firm attitude in demanding substantial reparation for the brutal massacre of English missionaries in China gives widespread satisfaction. It is fully expected that the despatch of the four British gunboats up the Yang Tse river will bring Prince Ching to his senses and at the same time go a long way towards defining and asserting Britain's position in the Yang-Tse valley.

Toronto, Oct. 22.—Reports received from Manitoba, by James Hartney, local government agent for that province, state that there is now no danger of a blockade of wheat, such as was experienced last year, on account of scarcity of cars. Wheat is now being taken rapidly from the elevators.
