

DAY'S MEETING.

Petitions For New Walks-That Montreal Street Wall-Renewing the Lease of Part of the Waterworks Wharf - Other

Business Transacted. The civic board of works convened n the city engineer's office at 4 p.m., vesterday. There were present : Chairman McLeod, Aldermen Harkness, Walkem, McFarlane, Dunlop and Craig. Several accounts were passed, including one for \$257.24 for supplies from Dalton & Strange. The general pay roll, amounting to \$694.25, was also ordered to be paid.

The engineer announced that more storage room was required by the city. Plenty of space was available at the water works wharf, and still leave sufficient there for the Donnelly Wrecking and Salvage company. The engineer and the chairman of the board of works had interviewed Messrs.
