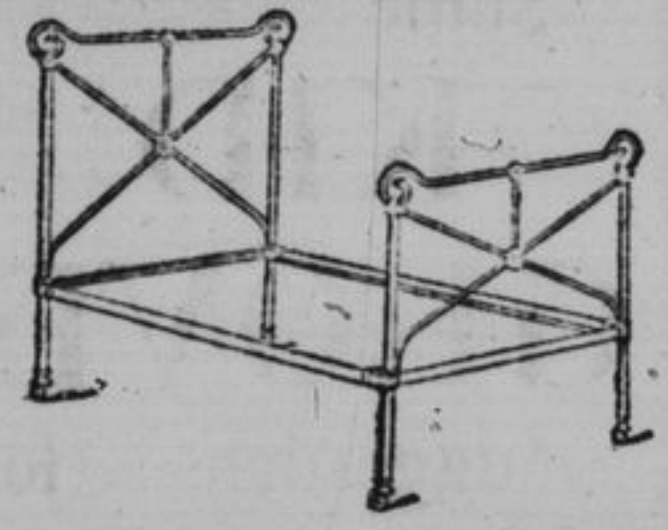

CITY COUNCIL.

DOINGS OF THE CITY FATHERS LAST NIGHT.

Frontenac Cereal Company Must Pay Taxes and Sue for Recovery—Tax Collector Criticized—End of Montreal Street Wall Agitation.

All kinds of things were doing at last night's meeting of the city council. The most sensational portion of the proceedings was the charge made by Ald. Behan, that Roman Catholics were being slowly crowded out of the city buildings.

When Clerk Shannon called the roll the names of the members were: Mayor Shaw, Alds. Abbott, Behan, Bell, Craig, Graham, Harkness, Hipson, Kent, King, Knapp, McCammon, McFarlane, McLeod, Sears, Tait, Walkem, White, Dunlop, Mallen.

Communications Considered. Macdonnell & Farrell, asking exemption on lots purchased recently from Capt. Gaslin.

C. E. Wrenshall, applying for usual exemption on Kingston School of Art. Court of revision.

Mrs. John Duff, thanking the council for the wreath of flowers, and resolution of sympathy on the death of her husband, Fyfe.

Canadian Fire Underwriters Association, acknowledging communication and promising early action.

John McIntyre, for the local board of health, asking council to put in force the by-law referred to in section 122 of the Health Act, regarding the flying of flags of plumbers in city streets in the city.

J. B. McIver, calling attention to a resolution passed by the board of trustees of Queen's University, on November 1st, 1900, granting three nominations for the benefit of pupils qualified to enter on a university course.

Ann Reynolds, applying for remission of taxes because of inability to pay. Court of revision.

Sarah Nesbitt, objecting to paying sewer rent. Board of works.

W. H. Sullivan, for estate of late Michael Hanigan, objecting to payment of sewer rent. Board of works.

Robert J. Fee, claiming that he is erroneously charged for sixty-nine feet of frontage for sewer rent. Board of works.

R. J. McLelland, R. Shaw, D. J. A. Evans, G. Latourner, F. H. Lougher, W. Peters, E. Lossie, George Dennison, Arthur Stevens, J. E. Hopkirk, for his son, Harry Walkem, applying for position in city engineer's office. Board of works.

Petitions Presented. Ald. McFarlane—From T. G. Montclair and others, asking for extension of water works system in Russell street. Water works committee.

Ald. Bell, Graham and Tait spoke in behalf of the ratepayers petitioning, who were represented as suffering for want of water.

Ald. Behan, while sympathizing with some of the sincere petitioners, said that some of them were suffering because of their own fault, as they had refused in the past to agree to take the service when it was obtainable.

However, he added his plea to that of the others, and requested that the prayer of the petition be granted if possible.

Ald. Graham wanted the service put in even though the income did not guarantee the eight per cent. exacted by the water works committee. He thought the saving of pure water to the ratepayers of more consequence than the carrying out of the committee's fixed rate of interest.

In reply, Aids. King and Walkem pointed out that according to law the department must exact an income sufficient to cover working expenses and payment of debentures, and the department had fixed that rate at eight per cent.

The mayor closed forth "specchifying" by referring the petition to the water works committee.
