Of Indian Agent Put Indians Away

CANADA'S CARE

WAS EXTENDED TO THEM IN EXTREMITY.

Refused to Receive Country's Wards Because They Were Not of His Reserve - Another Sample of United States Treatment of Its Red Men. Ottawa, Oct. 28.-It is learned at

the Indian department that there is no truth in the reports sent out from Helena, Mont., alleging that Canadian officials had sent into the United States Canadian Indians suffering from small-pox. The Indians concerned were United States Indians, and according to information supplied by the United States Indian police, they had been put across the boundary into Canada upon the order of Major Monteith, a gave instructions that they were not to be allowed to recross, not because The United States will contribute they were Canadian Indians, but beteith's) reservation.

On October 9th the Canadian officiof all they represent large capital, the Indians, suffering from small-pox, had crossed the boundary, and the Canadian Mounted Police were at once sent to the camp. Some of the Indians could not at the time be moved without endangering their lives, so the band was quarantined, food sent to them, and medical attendance provid-

When the physician in charge re ported the Indians were fit to be moved across the line, Mayor Monteith, the United States agent whom the Indian police had ordered to make the deportation, was requested to make arrangements for receiving them.

He refused to receive them, saying I shall resist by any and all means the putting upon this reservation of any Indians affected with small-pox, He who do not belong here."

He further suggested that if the Canadian police desired to cross the Indian's into the United States, they would have to take them beyond where the eastern boundary of his reservation intersests the international bounthat the democrats will carry the dary line and cross them at that point. Later, he telegraphed: "The Indians are not Peigans. I will not allow them in Blackfoot reservation." It thus appears that the United States agent deported these unfortuned States Indians, simply because they did not belong to his particular re servation. The Canadian police, on the other hand, provided them with food and medical attendance, although they

had no claim upon Canada. The Indians were Assinboines on sixty days' pass from the United States Belknap agency. It is customary for Indians from the United States and should have taken every possible means to prevent such a visit when small-pox was prevalent.


