



During the Past Year-Annual like to thank Mr. Gleeson, for his un- The Vessel Owners Have Trebled Held, and Officers Meeting Elected.

The annual meeting of the Home fo Friendless Women and Infants was held yesterday afternoon in the com mittee room, City hall. The annua statement of accounts showed receipts of \$2:017.20, made up of government grant, \$217.31; city council, \$175 county council, \$50; for care of inmates, \$720.50; donations, \$195.68; members' fees, and their work, \$659. 11. Every dollar was expended, for a deficit of \$642 from the previous year absorbed a large part. The year ended with a debt of \$121.74 only, since reduced by donations to \$88. The in come of the previous year was \$1,511 causing a deficit of \$218, so that a healthy and encouraging revival of support has occurred. Very hearty thanks were passed to Mrs. McCam mon, treasurer, upon adoption of the


