In his interesting narrative of that expedition he tells us that he left Halifax on July 1st and reached Victoria on October 11th, having travelled in all 5,314 miles, 2.185 miles of which were by waggon or saddle, and 485 by canoes or row boats. The distance from Halifax to Victoria was accomplished in 103 days, and as an illustration of the progress made by Canada, the same distance can now be overtaken in almost as many hours. 
